# CHILDREN ARE NOT FORGOTTEN AT BROTHER BENNO'S

(The following article appeared in the Brother Benno newsletter in 1998. Stories like these continue to happen today.)

Several years ago, a seven-year-old girl was waiting while her mother had an interview with a staff member about getting into a shelter. The time dragged on, and she looked so forlorn that volunteer **Pat Kouns** gave her some construction paper, crayons, a scissors, and stickers. "Here, honey, this'll give you something to do until your mother is finished," she said.

Sometime later, the little girl came to Pat and handed her a beautiful thank-you card that she'd made from the supplies Pat gave her. "I cried," Pat said, "it was so wonderful."

Many people don't realize how many children are helped in various ways at Brother Benno's. Saturday was a good example. It was a Back-to-School party, and 105 children were there.

As always, the day started with a meal and singing. Then the children lined up to receive new socks and underwear, a stuffed animal, and school supplies. The Brother Benno Auxiliary had given money for the purchase of new school uniform shirts for those who attend parochial school, and Thrift Store workers had put together packets of folders, paper, notebooks, and pencils. . . .

A huge sheet of paper lay on a table where the children were asked to trace their hand prints and sign their names as a thank-you card to all those who donate goods and money to Brother Benno's. It was then put on display at Walmart for continued on page 4...

**Just Down the Road**. A graduate of our Men's Recovery Program shared a beautiful story about what some people might call a coincidence but others at Brother Benno's call a "God Wink."

"Artie" was visiting his family for several weeks. They live in a small, isolated town; and as with many such gatherings, things got pretty stressful for Artie. He felt in great need of an AA meeting, but he knew there were none within a 50-mile radius, so he decided to do the best he could at an upcoming family dinner.

As he was driving down a long, winding road to his parents' house, he spotted a large dog heading his way. Being a dog-lover, he stopped and went to the dog. At that moment, a car came along and the driver, seeing Artie and the dog, stopped and got out of his car. Turned out, it was the man's dog, who had been heavily medicated, and the man said he was frantic, because in looking for the dog, he was afraid he was going to miss the new AA meeting that he himself was about to start!

The meeting was to be held at a school down the street, so Artie, the man, and the rescued dog headed that way. Artie found the peace he'd been looking for, and he was able to help another man at the meeting who needed the encouragement that Artie could offer.

**Exchange.** All items and services are provided to our Guests free of charge, but Brother Benno's believes it's good for people to give back whenever possible. Therefore, two services—laundry and replacement of personal papers such as ID's and birth certificates—require recipients to perform two hours of service at the Center in exchange. No one seems to be complaining about this arrangement.

Quilts. "Stitches of Hope" is an outreach ministry of Faith Temple Christian Center in Oceanside, whose members made and donated ten beautiful quilts to our Thrift Shop as a means of generating money for Brother Benno's. Helen Parsons, who oversees the Shop, reported that the ministry members who delivered the quilts to the Shop were Barbara Crayton and Brenda Howard. She added, "We are indeed grateful!"

Shop Manager **Michelle Hoppe** said that several quilts have already been sold. If you love beautiful quilts, hurry down to the Shop before they're all gone!

Cha... I'm always amazed by the great variety of backgrounds that our volunteers bring to Brother Benno's. A case in point is **Bill Harper**, who meets with Guests who need help paying their rent or utility bill or prescriptions.

About ten years ago, Bill formed a band of six musicians that he calls The Billy Harper Band, "The Band With a Beat." They play at senior centers and nursing homes, as well as for events like weddings and bar mitzvahs. Bill plays percussion and sometimes sings, and he said he'll even leave the stage to dance with one of the women in the audience. On one such occasion, the woman said to him, "I haven't danced with a man in 35 years!"

As he talked about his band, he reminisced about how he'd paid his way through college by performing with a band on weekends. Then after he married and they were expecting their first child, he again turned to music in order to accumulate enough money to pay the doctor and hospital for the upcoming birth.


