In his book, Soup Soap Hugs Hope, The Story of Brother Benno's Life-Changing Soup Kitchen, he featured her in his chapter titled "The Golden Years," at which time she was 81: "Dixie is our volunteer coordinator who assigns and keeps track of the hundreds of volunteers in our many different outreach programs. She has the drive of a 30-year-old, the energy of a 60-year-old, and the experience of a matriarch. When she sinks her teeth into a job, she's unstoppable. Visualize a bulldozer coming down a hill, and that's Dixie at work on a Brother Benno project. She gives new meaning to the word 'chutzpah'"!

Dixie started volunteering at Brother Benno's in 1992, nine years after the Foundation was formed. In 1996 she started the Brother Benno Auxiliary and served as its president in 1986, 2001, and 2009. She organized the popular Luncheon and Fashion Show, the Auxiliary's most successful fundraiser to this day. She was also in charge of special events such as our Thanksgiving

dinner, the huge Christmas party for our Program Members and Guests, and the Back-to-School event for kids.

In his remarks at her memorial service, Harold included this tribute to Dixie: "Brother Benno's would not be what we are today, were it not for the love, dedication, and hard work of Dixie. . . . I can only imagine Dixie being reunited in heaven with **Kay (Kutler), Blanche (Ogle)**, and **Virginia (Sylwestrzak)**, our saintly ladies who devoted their lives to serving the poorest of the poor. They have done God's work in this world, and I know their reward in heaven will be great."

All of us at Brother Benno's offer our condolences to Dixie's husband Lou and all her family. May she rest in peace.

A Visual Blessing. Sixteen men and women in our Recovery Programs were able to take advantage of the Lions Clubs outreach, California Lions Friends In Sight, on March 5 at the Oceanside Senior Center. At this event, they were given free vision screening, and, if appropriate, a free pair of recycled eyeglasses that have been donated to the Lions. If certain health conditions are noted during the screening, licensed volunteer optometrists and/or ophthalmologists give professional advice on seeking further care.

A Lotta Tuna! Thanks to Darren Parsons, VP of Trade Marketing for Chicken of the Sea, Brother Benno's will again receive a donation of canned tuna. Darren is the son of Board Member Helen Parsons, and our great windfall will be 2,240 cases (48 cans in a case) of 4.5 oz. cans! In case you don't have a calculator handy, that's 107,520 cans! Thank you, Darren and Chicken of the Sea!

Got Furniture? Michelle Hoppe, Manager of Brother Benno's Thrift Shop, is asking for gently used furniture. "It must be in good, clean, reusable condition, ready to hit the sales floor," she said. If you'd like to have it picked up, just call the furniture donation line (760-967-7507) and leave a message. Someone will call back to arrange for a pickup time convenient for you. Michelle added, "You can feel good about donating your furniture to us, because we will turn it into cash to help the poor in the local area."

Unbelievable Bargains. Another bit of news from the Thrift Shop is that the Shop will have an old-fashioned "Rummage Sale" on Sunday, April 17, complete with free root beer floats! You'll be able to fill a bag for only \$2 (cash only). They have an abundance of women's clothing and housewares, and also designer clothing and boxes of collectibles to choose from.

Seeing Is Powerful. I often run into people who have taken a tour of Brother Benno's; and

the most common thing they take away from that tour is this: "I never knew you did SO MUCH!" They usually continue with something like, "I knew you feed people, but I didn't know about all the other services you provide," and then they list the things that especially surprised them. UNUSUAL ORGAN DONATED TO THRIFT SHOP

What are the chances of a small reed organ, the kind that was used for religious services in the field during both World Wars, showing up at Brother Benno's Thrift Shop? Not likely, you say?

The story began when **Daniel Bissler**, a new volunteer, was talking with someone in the back of the Shop, and she mentioned that an organ had been donated and they weren't entirely sure what it was. Daniel looked at it and knew immediately.

It's called a Folding Chaplain's Organ; and by tracing the serial number, Daniel found that it was built between 1930 and 1935 by the Estey Organ Co. Of Brattleboro, Vermont. When not being used, it folds up into its own box with a handle on top for easy carrying.

Daniel recently moved to Oceanside from Maui, where he had been a stained glass artist. While restoring a window in a choir loft of a church in Hawaii, he acquired a pipe organ that had been decimated by termites. "It took a year to restore the organ," he said, "and it was in my loft in my home in Hawaii. The neighbors loved to hear it play!"

Helen Parsons, who oversees the Brother Benno Thrift Shop, knew about Daniel's many skills from the short questionnaire he had filled out after he took our Center tour. She asked if he'd be willing to look at the organ and determine whether or not it

"RELUCTANT" MOTHER FINDS HELP AT BROTHER BENNO'S

"Darlene" and her two children, ages 12 and 6, lived in their car in a nearby campground for four months before she learned about Brother Benno's. This situation was brought about when Darlene's husband left them. She had almost no financial resources and no other family nearby to support them.

At the time, she had enough money to pay for the campsite, where she and the children could use the restrooms, showers, and picnic table next to their car; but she knew this was only a temporary fix. She signed up for Welfare, which included food stamps, and a few months later she found an apartment she thought she could afford. But after putting down the deposit, she didn't have enough left to pay the first month's rent.

Someone told her she might be able to get help at Brother Benno's, so she came to the Center–reluctantly–because she wasn't used to having to ask for help. When she and her children sat down with **Mary Holguin**, one of our case managers, she continued to hesitate when she was asked what she needed.

Mary was able to gently encourage her by explaining the various ways we could help, and eventually she agreed to the first month's rent and some clothing for her and the children. (When they'd had to leave their home, they brought along almost nothing.) We were also able to give them mattresses, bedding, and cooking utensils. "They were so happy with everything we gave them," Mary said.

At some point after their first visit to Brother Benno's, Darlene went to court and began receiving child support. She plans to get a job when her children are both in school full days; but for now, she is volunteering in her son's kindergarten classroom. She calls Mary every once in a while, just to tell her that they are doing well and to thank her again for all the help she received. When Mary asks if there's anything else they need, Darlene says no, she's sure there are other people who need help more than she does.


