YEAR-ROUND WAYS TO HELP

Hygiene items show up on our Needs list almost every month, so we decided to get specific as to what our needs are and how they're used. These are the items we need: toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, body wash, lotion, bar soap, single-blade Bic razors, and shaving cream.

The small motel-size articles are given to the homeless, and the regular sized items are used for the men's and women's houses. (Men's houses are for Program Members; women's houses take care of homeless women and children and women in need of a sober-living environment.)

Hygiene packs (about 1,000 a year) are put together for the homeless for the five major holidays, and they include a new pair of socks and tee shirt, as well as a deck of playing cards (donated by the Pechanga and Valley View Casinos). The Staff is already looking ahead to the needs for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Next time you're out shopping, consider dropping a package of one of these items into your cart for Brother Benno's. The need is year-round, and the smiles you'll get when you drop them off at the warehouse in back of the Center are priceless. (Greg, the warehouse manager, promised!).

That may require getting more involved at Brother Benno's, or simply performing "random acts of kindness" toward the poor—perhaps just giving someone a smile. When I do that, I usually get a smile in return, as well as a feeling that I am in the right place to try to make a difference


