EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Making a Difference. Students in grades 6, 7, and 8 from the Rock Church in San Marcos came to the Center in June to present us with a supply of children's books, as well as hygiene items and socks. There were ten girls, three boys, and several parents.

Cynthia Aguirre was the young girl who initiated the collection, which took a month to complete, as a way of giving back to the community and showing that children can make a difference. Anna Sorokina and Adam Dzwigalski are also leaders of the group.

"It was beautiful," said one of our volunteers, after he met with the students



Teamwork. In recent years, I've noticed how Brother Benno's has been teaming up with other organizations that help the poor and homeless, which is obviously a win-win situation for everyone. I just met Jazmin Hernandez, a lovely young woman who works for Interfaith Community Services. She spends Tuesday mornings at the Brother Benno Center, meeting with some of our Guests who need services beyond what Brother Benno's is able to offer. And she told me that her co-worker, Christopher Torres, comes in on Mondays.

One of our Staff members makes an announcement every Monday and Tuesday during the early-morning mealtime, telling our Guests that someone from Interfaith will be available; and he lists the particular services that are available to them.

One of Interfaith's services is to obtain ID's for people. "The State is now giving copies of

birth certificates free," Jazmin said. "Before, there was an \$8 charge, and Interfaith paid it."

They also help people find jobs by giving them job leads, helping to prepare resumes, and offering classes in financial literacy so that people can make good choices with their money once they're working. They also give out bus passes or gas cards at the beginning so the people they help can get to and from the job site. And when funds are available, Interfaith offers rent assistance.

Angels At Work. A single mom with an infant came to the Center recently to get food. She left the baby's stroller on the sidewalk, and when she came out later, the stroller was gonepresumably stolen.

One of our volunteers went to a local estate sale warehouse, where he found a nearly new stroller. It was unpriced, and the warehouse owner said she'd get back to him with a price. She called the next day and said the stroller was ready to be picked up; it was being given to us as a gift. Turns out that Linda, a manager in the warehouse, bought the stroller so she could donate it to the mom. Our volunteer said, "What an angel! The mom was delighted with the new stroller."

Every Little Bit Helps. I ran into Robert Hackett, our Purchasing Agent, the other day, and I asked him what the current needs are. Without missing a beat, he said, "Diapers, peanut butter, and coffee. In other words, the same old stuff we always need." Then with a grin, he added, "If someone wants to donate a pallet of peanut butter, that'd be great!"

A pallet or a jar-it's all welcome.

OVERFLOWING WITH GRATITUDE by Julie Petrie

It started with a phone call. I could tell there was a very distressed lady on the line—I'll call her "Lynn"—saying she was relocating to the San Diego area from up north and needed to find out about our services. She explained she wasn't alone; she'd be bringing her permanently disabled son with her, and she was in desperate need of food and clothing.

Lynn's voice kept breaking up as she talked, and I could tell she was very nervous. Gently I informed her of our services, and that all she needed to do was get herself and her son to our Center and we'd take care of the rest. The relief in her voice was palpable, and she said over and over how grateful she was for Brother Benno's being there in her time of extreme need. This touched my heart as I gave her directions slowly, trying to make sure she wouldn't get lost.

When she arrived, the first thing she asked for was food. After filling out our application form, we gave her a food voucher and directed her to our warehouse, where she received her first box of food, along with other miscellaneous items. Since our Clothing Room was already closed, she said she'd come back the next day.

The people who find their way to Brother Benno's don't always tell us what circumstances drove them to seek help, and we don't ask, as this is not a requirement to receive our services. Since Lynn filled two small plates with food and took them out to her car, we assumed it was easier for her son not to have to come into the Center, or maybe they weren't comfortable eating with a group of strangers.

The next day, Lynn did return to "shop" in our Clothing Room. She was over-the-top with gratitude, as her son was in need of so many things. Offering her these items of clothing gave her a feeling of being loved and cared for. She just kept saying over and over again how thankful she was for Brother Benno's, tearing up as she gave us all hugs.

As she left that day, I hugged her again; and what she said next is the reason why all of us do what we do, day after day: "Thank you so much! You saved my life, and I am so grateful. I can't thank you enough. God bless all of you here, and

God bless Brother Benno's! We will never forget the unbelievable kindness you have shown to both me and my son."

Both of us were crying. She was giving back the only thing she had to give—her love.


