MORE THAN JUST A SOUP KITCHEN

Many in our community still think of Brother Benno's as just a soup kitchen. When our Founders, **Harold** and **Kay Kutler**, served our first Guests in a small back yard in Oceanside in October 1983, that's exactly what we were. However, it didn't take long to realize that many of those we served suffered from the disease of addiction to drugs and alcohol. Over time, as we grew and moved into larger facilities, we began a Recovery Program based on the 12-Step Program of Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.). In fact, the Brother Benno Center couldn't run without the Program, and the Program couldn't run without the Center. It is a magical, symbiotic relationship.

Our Program. We offer a 26-week, 2-phase program of recovery where up to 40 men and women at a time are given the opportunity to change their lives and become productive members of society. We provide them with food, clothing, and shelter in exchange for the hours they spend serving our Guests at the Brother Benno Center. In the evenings, Program Members are transported to A.A. meetings where they receive recovery. Many of them used to be our Guests who suffered from chronic homelessness as a result of their addiction. The beauty and uniqueness of our Program lies in what we, on the Recovery Staff, refer to as "the Brother Benno experience." A common refrain from Program Members who have been through other recovery programs is: "There is no other program like Brother Benno's; there is some kind of 'magic' that happens here."

There is something magical that happens when these men and women in early recovery have the opportunity to serve people who are currently where *they* were just a short time ago. It reminds them from where they have come. If they hadn't *yet* lost everything, the experience paints a very clear picture of where they would have ended up if they had continued further down the path. Being of service to our Guests also gives them the opportunity to change their perspective from one of self-centeredness to that of other-centeredness. This change of perspective is an essential ingredient in the recipe for success in remaining clean and sober and obtaining a productive and happy life.

Who They Are. For many who come into the Brother Benno Recovery Program, we are the "last house on the block." Because so many of them are from the homeless population, they have limited options. They typically have no family support, are unemployed and unemployable, have no medical insurance and no sense of self-worth. Many literally come in with not much more than the clothes on their backs. However, by the time they complete our Program six months later, they have gained new relationships and a large support network, have begun to re-establish family relationships, have gained valuable work experience, and have developed a solid resume. Most have found a job and have begun to become financially independent. If we have a bed available in our sober-living house, they may be given an opportunity to stay with us beyond six months, while paying affordable rent and continuing to build a solid

EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

We Share. Occasionally the generosity of our donors means that we have an excess of a particular item in our trove of donations. Rather than store the extra items in the warehouse, we re-donate them to other organizations that have a need at that time, and they do the same for us. In that way, many people in need are able to receive immediate help from whichever organization is most convenient for them. This is just one of the many ways that Brother Benno's partners with other groups in order to provide the best services possible.

Ah, That Feels Good. At the risk of repeating ourselves, we have another of those "little things" that seem to show up at Brother Benno's on a regular basis. A young man named "Peter," homeless and barefoot, walked into the Center one morning. Frank, a volunteer, noticed Peter's discomfort and offered to find him a pair of shoes. "What size do you wear?" he asked. "12 or 13."

After a short search, Frank didn't find the right size. "Here, put these slippers on while I keep looking." he said," Watching Peter slip his tired feet into a pair of soft slippers made Frank's day.

"I finally found a pair of shoes that fit him," he said, "and I told him, "Keep the slippers, too."

A Helpful Solution. One of the many problems faced by our homeless Guests is that they have no place to keep the few personal papers that are often necessary in order for them to receive services from other agencies. Even if they manage to cram them into a backpack, they are often damaged or lost.

Dennis Pinnick, one of our staff members, has found a solution. In a filing cabinet in his office, he has set aside one drawer for all the personal papers of Guests he works with on a regular basis. Since he often sets up appointments for them, he simply hands them the needed papers on the day of the appointment and reminds them to bring them back the next day. It's just one more personal touch that tells people we care about them.

HAROLD'S MISSION STATEMENT CONCERNING RECOVERY PROGRAM

Harold Kutler had a special concern for men and women suffering from addictions, and he spoke eloquently about it in his book, *Soup Soap Hugs Hope, the Story of Brother Benno's Life-Changing Soup Kitchen*, (page 133):

"We must accept the reality that neither we nor anybody else can 'fix' them. The addict must make the decision to do whatever is necessary to crawl out of the ditch and work through the shame and destroyed self-esteem. This journey is almost impossible without a commitment to the Twelve-Step program of AA, along with the love, acceptance, forgiveness, and prayers of those who love and care about the addict.

"Our mission statement at Brother Benno's embraces *Matthew* 25, which encompasses all aspects of recovery:

"Feed the hungry. The addict needs physical food, but even more desperately, he needs food for the spirit.

"Give drink to the thirsty. The addict needs physical drink, but even more she needs to drink in love, acceptance, and support.

"Shelter the homeless. We not only shelter them, but we also provide them with a home and an extended family.

"Clothe the naked. We give them clothing to cover their bodies, and we reach out to clothe their spirit.

"Comfort the sick. Addiction is a disease that damages both body and soul. We provide a program to help them get well.

"Visit the prisoner. Being imprisoned by addiction is a living hell. By interacting with the men and women in our recovery program, we become part of the key that will open the gate to their freedom."

foundation that will support continued sobriety and productivity.

Collateral Damage. Everyone is affected by the disease of addiction. Most have a relative or friend who suffers from substance abuse. If you are one of the fortunate few who are not directly impacted, you are most assuredly suffering from collateral damage; insurance rates, grocery costs, taxes, and crime rates are all negatively impacted due to addiction. The disease of addiction is generational. Those who complete our Program and remain sober are able to give their children a stable home and a healthy parent. This gives them the best possible chance of ending the generational cycle of homelessness and substance abuse.

Our Staff. At Brother Benno's, we have a dedicated Recovery Staff. Three are certified CADC-Il (California Alcohol and Drug Counselors, Supervisor Level); however, we choose to call ourselves Recovery Mentors because the word "mentor" perfectly defines what we try to do: lead by example. The Mentor Staff represents over 50 years of sobriety and approximately 40 years of experience working in the field of recovery. We have a passion for guiding our Program Members through the early stages of recovery. Dr. Bob, founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, summed up the program of A.A. in two words: "Love" and "Service." I believe that is also the "magic" of Brother Benno's.

GENENTECH PROVIDES GRANT FOR "FOOD INSECURITY"

Richard Giroux, President of the Brother Benno Foundation, announced recently that Genentech has provided a \$75,000 grant to Brother Benno's to provide much needed resources to fight the problem of food insecurity in our community. According to Genentech, "We believe that doing good begins in our own backyard. We envision a

world where the barriers presented by economic disparities are overcome, enabling people from all walks of life to create their own futures."

What Is Food Insecurity? A recent study found that one in six San Diego County residents, or 494,000 of our neighbors, live with food insecurity, which means they have little or no food available at home, and they do not know how they will get their next meal—or the one after that.

Children are disproportionately affected. Twenty percent in San Diego County live in food-insecure households. The face of food insecurity can also be a senior on a fixed income, the working poor, or a military family. Not surprisingly, malnutrition and poor health are the results of not having enough nutritious food. It also puts a household at greater risk of homelessness. Many food-insecure households are making daily choices between using their available funds to pay rent, buy needed prescriptions, pay utilities, or buy food.

How We Help. A primary mission of Brother Benno's has always been to feed the hungry and alleviate food insecurity. We provide hot meals six days a week, sack lunches five days a week, and monthly food boxes, which provide enough food for a family of four for up to three days, or feed a senior for a full week.

As the homeless crisis has grown in our area, the social safety net provided by many service organizations and agencies have been strained beyond their limits; and consequently some have long waiting lists for their services. Unlike others, Brother Benno's is open six days a week, and fortunately we have no waiting list. We provide food, comfort, and aid six days a week, 52 weeks a year, at our Center.


