



EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Caring In a Big Way. Girlfriends Care has been a big supporter of Brother Benno's for years. Many of the things they do are for the women and children in our shelters. Recently I saw an array of pretty gift bags in Mary Robinson's office, each filled with "girl things" like lotions, scarves, books, journals, nail polish, and one of their signature items: a hand-made prayer pillowcase in lovely colors. And for children, small stuffed animals, books, and a pillowcase. These bags are placed on the bed for each new resident at MAMI (the House of Martha Ann Mary and Ida) and DBRJ (the House of Dorothy Barbara Rosemary and Joan). It's a silent but powerful message: We Care About You

At the October meeting of Girlfriends Care, a boutique was set up for the members to buy gently used clothing and accessories. The proceeds of \$405 will pay for things like school books, work necessities, haircuts, bus vouchers, undies, etc. to help the women once again become self-sufficient.

Lifted Up. On a busy Tuesday morning at the Center, I sat down with three women who were waiting to check in at the Intake office, and I asked them why they came to Brother Benno's. One woman said, in a matter-of-fact way: "They feed me when I'm broke." Another said she was a volunteer here in the late 70's, but now she was in need of help. "They treat you like people," she said. "They lift you up, they don't beat you down." Explaining her dark glasses and long cane, she told me she lost her vision in 2004. "But I'm OK," she said. "I learned Braille, so I can still read my Bible. And I'm going to teach my grandkids Braille, too. I can do that."

A Teen's Outreach. The *North County Times* alerted me to the fact that a Boy Scout. Daniel Wille, completed the requirements to earn his Eagle Award by building a fence at one of Brother Benno's Houses this past summer. Thomas Hague, a Servant of the Poor who lived at the House, said that Daniel organized the project and oversaw help from other boys in his troop. "He

worked very hard for three weekends," Thomas said, "and he not only replaced parts of the rotted fence, but also a damaged gate. Plus, he provided all the materials and tools and carted away the debris."

Extra-Special Gifts. Lighthouse Christian Church in Oceanside donated one hundred hand-knitted stocking caps. What a boon for our guests as winter settles in! And Dr. Michael Willes, an orthodontist in Carlsbad, gave us about 100 pounds of "buy-back" Halloween candy and a good supply of toothbrushes. "We 'buy' the candy from kids," said his wife **Heidi**, "and then donate it to Brother Benno's." She said they pay the kids about a dollar a pound, and they match that amount to each child's school as well. They've done this for twelve years in a row. Sounds like a win-win-win all around.

With Gratitude. I know I speak for everyone at Brother Benno's when I wish all our friends and supporters a Blessed and Peaceful Christmas. Remember, you make what we do possible by your gifts of time, talent, and treasure. **Merry Christmas!**

SCHOOL TOUR MAKES HUGE IMPRESSION

Children sometimes say the most profound things. **Teresa Roberts'** seventh grade class at St. John the Evangelist School in Encinitas produced some gems in their thank-you letters to Brother Benno's after their field trip to the Center in September.

Board members **Helen Parsons** and **Mary Robinson** each took a group of the students on a tour of the facility, then organized them into work groups to sort books for the Reading Room and pack rice and beans. The following are excerpts from the children's letters, which were addressed to either Mary or Helen:

"I can't believe that one person can help so many people! It really made me understand that anyone can make a difference. . . . It was truly an honor to meet Mr. Kutler. It was like being in the presence of a Saint!" P.

"I thought it (the tour) was a very fun, educational, and religious experience. . . now I feel the urgent need to go and help somebody out, or at least give away some of my toys. . . . "I now would like to help out more and donate some of my things. (The tour) has helped me to not take things for granted. It has also helped me to treat my things better, because I am lucky to have them." A.S.

"I learned that I can be happy even if I am

down. Even though all those people were poor, they still had a smile of their faces." D.B.

"Now I know homeless shelters aren't just about feeding the poor. They have to do with becoming a family with everyone because we all are in God's family. We are all brothers and sisters. This has really interested me to do more community service for the poor." K.G.

"I was very impressed by the amazing story and past of the facility. I was so happy to know that you did it for no pay." N.S.

"I think it is really cool of you guys to help out so many people for free and volunteer your own time." R.M.
