Girlfriends Care—along with their counterparts, Guys, Teens, and Kidz—will be on hand at the Brother Benno Center on Saturday, December 10, in what they call their Annual Holiday Volunteer Blitz. We thought it would interest our readers to know exactly what a huge "blitz" this will be!

Their list of volunteer opportunities for their members looks like this:

- 10 food servers
- 2 serving assistants to help carry trays and assist with beverages
- 2 greeters
- 4 gift givers to hand out small gifts at the door
- 2 Books Love Kids to listen to and read to chil dren and hand out books
- 7 gift-bag compilers who also write cards of encouragement for women in our transitional housing
- 2 photographers to take candid shots (avoiding face shots of Guests to protect privacy)
- 20 placemats and lunch bags decorators (great job for kids and teens)
- 10 Christmas stocking fillers (200 stockings!)

Then on Wednesday, December 14, another group of their members will be part of Santa's Closet at the Brother Benno Thrift Shop, a time for our Program Guys and Gals to get gifts for their family members. Again, they will provide:

- 10 personal shoppers to help with selections 10 gift wrappers
- 2 holiday card assistants

When gifts and cards need to be mailed, Girlfriends prepare them—and pay for—shipping.

If this year is anything like previous years, all these volunteers will bring not only their service, but also a real spirit of love and caring.

EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Smiles. Every day, small groups come to the Center to perform simple tasks like decorating lunch bags or wrapping forks and knives in napkins for our daily meal. Outgoing Auxiliary President Carol Sanford reported that a Guest told her he keeps the lunch bags we give out after the morning meal because the cheerful drawings and messages make him smile. She responded that he should see the smiles on the faces of the children and adults who decorate those bags. Another win-win.

That's Early! Speaking of lunches, a small group of volunteers comes in every morning around 4:30, six days a week, to make sandwiches and add fruit, chips, and cookies to the bags. Guests who are registered at Brother Benno's can request a lunch bag as they go through the meal line.

Busy Hands. Last month in the Auxiliary News, we inadvertently left our the name of one of the knitters who has volunteered to make blankets and caps for newborns and crutch covers for Wounded Warriors at Camp Pendleton. Her name is Carole Whitcher, and she lives in Carlsbad. Another of the knitters, Greta Kertz, brought in ten large bags of items that she either made or purchased—blankets, caps, and onesies. Along with Sue Cooper, Carol McClelland, and Judy Doose, these women are helping to take care of a lot of babies and veterans!

Like Mother Hubbard's Cupboard. The Clothing Room at the Center is woefully bare in the men's area. With winter weather waiting in the wings, we are hoping to see donations of jeans, hoodies, sweatshirts, coats, warm socks, and comfortable walking shoes. We can also use small blankets suitable for those who must sleep outdoors. Maybe this is a good time to make room in our closets for all those new clothes we'll be getting for Christmas!

Another Way to Give. Sprouts Markets are in the middle of a Grab'N Give program that

will benefit Brother Benno's. They have pre-filled bags of groceries that customers can "buy" at a discounted price, and these bags will then be given to us to give to our Guests. Participating stores in our area are in Carlsbad on El Camino Real and Hwy. 78, and in Oceanside on College Blvd. At Hwy. 76. The drive will end on December 31.

Another Success. I often have a chance to talk to a Staff member or volunteer who is a recovering alcoholic or drug user. Some have graduated from the Brother Benno Recovery Program, while others participated in other programs. In any case, many of them have inspiring stories to tell.

"Roger" said he began drinking when he was 13 and didn't stop until he reached 52. He was homeless and in very poor health when he woke up one morning and said out loud, 'God, I can't do this anymore!' "I didn't kneel down like I was praying," he said. "I just cried out."

He'd been to Brother Benno's many times for meals and other services, but that morning he walked into the Center with a whole new attitude. He sat down with two of the men who are part of our Recovery Program; they sent him to McAlister Institute for detox; and he came back ready to do whatever it took to stay sober.

"God took away my craving for drink," he said. "I haven't had any desire to go back to my old ways." He said other guys tell him that they have a real hard time traveling, going to other cities, but Roger hasn't had that experience himself. "I'm just fine wherever I am," he said.

Like many of our other Program graduates, Roger gives back by sharing his skills at the Center; and he's also a mentor to the men and women who are currently in the Program.

He carries a picture in his wallet of himself when he was homeless. "Can you believe I'm that same guy?" he said, after telling his story. I look at the picture and then back at Roger. "Wow" is all I can say.


