EVERYTHING YOU EVER WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT THE BROTHER BENNO THRIFT SHOP

Most people who are familiar with the Brother Benno Thrift Shop probably think the only benefit is the money it provides for the overall operation of the Brother Benno Foundation—the Center and all its services, and our successful addiction recovery program for men and women. While that goal is important, the Shop means so much more to the community as a whole.

The customer base is primarily families who are struggling to make ends meet. They can find good-quality clothing, housewares, furniture, electronics, toys, books, linens, and more. The last Saturday of every month, most of the merchandise is 50 percent off, and shoppers stream in all day long.

Beyond the Shop. In addition to sales, the Shop has answered calls from other charities to donate items, especially furniture and housewares. Recently, Catholic Charities asked for help for three refugee families who arrived in our country with nothing; and our staff and volunteers worked hard to fill their most immediate needs of furniture and clothing. (Catholic Charities handles 30 to 40 new immigrant families per month.)

Whenever the Shop and Center have an excess of donations, items are re-donated to other homeless outreach groups, as well as an orphanage in Tijuana, Mexico.

The Shop recently donated books to a non-profit group called "Education Begins in the Home," and also to the Friends of the Library in Oceanside. Holiday paper goods were given to the Oceanside Senior Centers, and a large nativity scene was donated to St. Mary Star of the Sea Church in Oceanside.

Michelle Hoppe, Thrift Shop Manager, reports that a long-time volunteer sends children's clothing and toys to the Philippines, using her own money to pay for shipping. "We believe sharing our bounty with others in need brings more blessings our way," Michelle said.

The Volunteers. The Shop has a small core of paid staff, plus more than forty volunteers who find the joy of being part of a team dedicated to serving others. This crew sorts donations, assists shoppers, sells furniture, hangs clothing, keeps shelves neat, and helps the staff with a variety of other jobs.

The Thrift Shop believes in educating the community regarding the plight of the neediest among us in North County by inviting college students, businesses, church groups, and the military to take a tour of the Brother Benno Center and Thrift Shop. Many who take these tours end up coming back to volunteer—sometimes individually and other times as a group.

EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

New Windows. Our Recovery Program staff is happy to report that we now have new windows in our women's sober-living House of Blanche, Dixie, and Virginia. The entire cost of the windows was donated, as well as a good portion of the installation, provided by Re-Nu Windows.

The old windows were "really old," making them difficult to open and close. Plus, a bonus with this job was the removal of a large, dead pine tree in the yard, which had been a safety concern.

We need volunteer truck drivers, mostly to pick up daily donations from area stores. Brother Benno's provides the trucks, gas, and insurance. No special driver's license is required, but drivers need to be able to lift heavy boxes. A driver is always accompanied by at least one helper, sometimes two.

Donations are picked up Monday through Saturday mornings, and a driver can choose how many days he wishes to volunteer. If you're interested, or would like more information, please call Richard (760-445-9905).

A New Idea? A donor came up with a creative way to give. She used her credit card points to purchase 24 \$25 gift cards to Target, which we can use to buy specific items needed by our Program Members or Guests. I suspect that some of us let our points go to waste; here's a way to make them matter to someone less fortunate.

Ouch! A volunteer noticed that one of our Guests was wearing shoes that were so beat up that the soles flopped as she walked. She showed him where a tack had become lodged in one sole, and a sore was developing in that spot. He found two pairs of shoes in the Clothing Room that he thought she might like—running shoes and what he called "Cinderella shoes." Both pairs fit, and she's now one happy walker!

Connections. One of our staff members brought her mother to Tri-City Hospital for an extended stay. When an employee came out to the car with a wheelchair, they were surprised that they knew each other; the employee is a graduate of our Recovery Program! "It was so nice to be helped by someone my mother and I knew," she said.

John Jarvie and Ron Lamb continue to spruce up our Kitchen area. Their latest contribution is a new sink and cabinet behind the food-serving line where workers can wash their hands. Another sink in that area is used only for cleaning vegetables.

For the Babies! We are continually in need of Pampers at the Center, as so many of our Guests have children, particularly the single moms who are living in their car. We never have nearly enough to go around. Pictured below is **Sydney Leff**, who is the lead for a group at the **East Escondido Rotary Club** who have decided to donate 12 to 15 boxes of Pampers on a monthly basis to Brother Benno's for the next year.

From a grandmother ~~

"My family and I are not homeless. I am on disability, and my daughter works hard as a caregiver. We are the working poor. There is never enough money to go around, no matter how hard we all try. Just putting food on the table and clothing us is next to impossible after rent and utilities.

"We have been coming to Brother Benno's for many years. (The) food boxes have saved us many times. We have been able to pick up school clothes for my grandchildren, work clothes for my daughter, and comfy clothing for me—all thanks to Brother Benno's.

"The kindness, care, food, and friendly faces at Brother Benno's are a blessing to me and my family. The cat food and cat litter are so helpful for our cat family members. And I have a small bird, too, and thanks to the produce center in the back, my bird gets yummy things to eat that I can't afford, like raspberries, kale, snow peas, sprouts, apples, and corn—and he doesn't care if it is not perfect. I have a nice little fresh herb garden going, with basil, marjoram, mint, tarragon, and chives.

"I just wanted to tell you guys at Brother Benno's how much we all appreciate your help and support. You make the quality of our lives much better. The staff is always friendly, and nobody ever makes me feel like a beggar. So in these very difficult times we are all facing, I had to let you know your efforts and hard work and smiles, well, they really do make a difference. Thank you all."

"I would like to take a minute and say that Brother Benno's saved my life. The support they offer, not just for the poor and homeless, but the broken and scared as well. The people that work there on a daily basis, Dennis, Darryl, Jan, Bear, Pelon, and countless others, are amazing; and it's people like them that keep the Center afloat that I want to thank. New donation signs have been posted, directing donors to the intake site near the rear of the building. Please do not leave donations outside when the drop-off site is closed. We've learned that many of those items are stolen.


