HAROLD'S WORDS CONTINUE TO INSPIRE VOLUNTEERS AND STAFF

In **Harold Kutler's** book, *Soup Soap Hugs Hope, The Story of Brother Benno's Life-Changing Soup Kitchen*, he continually stressed the importance of treating the people who come to us for help in a loving and respectful way. That starts with calling them Guests instead of clients, and it ends only when they no longer need our services. This excerpt from the book is typical of Harold's thinking:

"Even though the Brother Benno Center is housed in a huge warehouse, the inside looks more like a party place. Color is everywhere. Decorations appropriate to the season or holiday draw you in. . . .

"Everything is clean—the food-serving area, the tables, the floor. People hug and smile and laugh. Music plays—quietly in the background or right up front. . . . Table coverings in the dining room are the extra touch that say, 'You are our Guest.'

"Kay sings to the Guests-tender songs like 'May the Good Lord Bless and Keep You" or rousers such as "I'm Just Wild About Harry!'* . .

"The grandest party of all is Christmas, which we celebrate—not once, but twice a year—in December and July. The dining room bursts with color and warmth, but now the warehouse has been transformed as well. As adults and children walk into Santa's Village, they are overwhelmed by a wall of 1,500 stuffed animals. ** (Their) last stop is our jolly Santa. He gives them candy, but his sweetest gifts are his cheery Ho-Ho-Ho's."

EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Thanksgiving Day at Brother Benno's, we hosted a crowd of 244 happy diners, a little more than last year. With festive table decorations, eager volunteers, and pleasant music, it was a day of making our Guests feel even more special than on ordinary days. We thank all our kind supporters for their donations that made this day possible.

Carol Muehe reports that we've had a great outpouring of donations of women's and children's underwear. Thanks to everyone who replenished our supply of these often-forgotten items of clothing. She also asks that donations of shoes be limited to the comfy kind, like tennis shoes. Our Guests-men, women, and children-almost never need dress shoes.

Re-Connection. We've reported in the past that our special Outreach Team often helps homeless men and women obtain copies of official documents such as birth certificates. A side benefit of this service is that it sometimes re-opens communication between the Guest and his or her family when a Team member has to contact the Guest's parents in order to procure the document.

Young Artists. Students from Roosevelt Middle School in Oceanside painted pictures of some of our homeless Guests, and they are now hanging in the Brother Benno Thrift Shop. Helen Parsons invites everyone to stop in and see them. "These are real human beings with real needs," she said.

The Shop is open Tuesdays through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 to 5 at 3955 Mission Avenue in Oceanside. And while you're there, you might see something to buy that you just can't find anywhere else. AND – be prepared for shockingly low prices!

A Reflection. The vision of the homeless man haunted me for months. He was filthy, crumpled on the ground and leaning against the building in the parking lot in front of my car at the Brother Benno Center. Before I could get my car door

open, he said, "Will you help me?"

I cringed, thinking he might be asking me for a ride. What do you need?" I asked. His answer was lost in a jumble of words, maybe because he had hardly any teeth, or he was under the influence.

"You'll have to go inside," I said, waving my arm in the direction of the main door.

"Naw," he said, and again the rest of his words were unintelligible.

"I'm sorry," I said, as I unlocked my car. Then as an afterthought, I asked him his first name, planning to tell him I'd pray for him; but by that time he'd turned away from me and had slid back down on the ground. I got into my car and drove out of the lot, my heart feeling uneasy.

As a Christian, I'm well aware of Jesus' words: "What you do for the least of my brethren, you do for me." And it follows that when we fail to help others, we fail to serve Jesus.

What should I have done? At least I could have gone back into the Center and asked one of the men on staff to come out and talk to the man. I know they do that all the time, as I often see them outside, ministering to those who aren't able or willing to come in; or who sometimes have been temporarily banned because of bad behavior. But I simply drove away.

Doing the "right thing" is a constant challenge, one that we have to struggle with over and over. I continue to pray that I choose "right" more often than not.


