



GUESTS AT WOMEN'S HOUSES CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS

Some Brother Benno supporters focus on our Women's Houses, because they feel a special affinity for women and children who face difficult challenges in their lives. This past Christmas, many of those supporters saw to it that our guests at MAMI and DBRJ felt the love of the season in a way that perhaps they'd never felt before.

Jan Roberts, who manages both Houses, saw to it that each House was decorated and had a Christmas tree. The women who live in the Houses were invited to come to the Center before Christmas to pick out gifts for their children, or for nieces and nephews. Women from HOW (Helping Other Women), members of the Brother Benno Auxiliary, provided dinner, other delectable treats, and gifts for the women and children.

At the time of this writing, two children, ages 7 and 20 months, are living at MAMI with their mother full-time; and one, age 3, comes to be with his mother every other weekend. These mothers wrote the following about what Christmas meant to them this year:

"My Christmas at MAMI was better than I thought it would be. I was going through a lot and didn't have very much money, so I figured that my girls wouldn't have a Christmas. The staff of Brother Benno's, and the volunteers, made my children's Christmas a very special one. They had gifts to open and smiles on their faces and happiness in their hearts. Because of donations (from Brother Benno supporters), my kids had a warm, fun-filled holiday, and that's all I could ask for. Thank you to Brother Benno's staff, volunteers, and to everyone who donated this year. K.R."

"Christmas this year was a huge blessing. My three-year-old son got to experience it all. He had special people to share it with, joy, wonder, excitement, and gifts delivered by Santa Claus. He was thrilled! I could not have asked for a better Christmas, and it was all made possible by the generous works of Brother Benno's. I am so grateful for all they have done to make Christmas 2010 the best it could possibly be. R.R."

Now that the holidays are over, Jan is making it possible for these two mothers to attend an eight-week parenting class put on by Lifeline in Oceanside (nclifeline.org). They can bring their children with them, so babysitting isn't a problem. Mary Robinson, Board member who oversees our Women's Houses, said: "We've been trying to have the ladies at MAMI take self-improvement classes to prompt them into action in learning a little more so they can better deal with their situations."

Jan is also testing out a change in length of stay at MAMI so the women have the time they need to get back on their feet.

Thanks to this scholarship, I am all the more closer to accomplishing my goals. . . . I really appreciate all that you have done for me. K.P."

"Thank you for allowing me to receive this wonderful, generous award. . . . I am honored and proud to be a Brother Benno recipient. . . . I will be attending CSUSM for my BA in Business Administration, am pursuing a career in Business Management in the Medical Technologies field. I am really excited about where my life is headed. . . I have big dreams, and I know they are obtainable as long as I work hard. . . . This will help fulfill my goals to be a self-supporting member of society and a healthy role model for my daughter.

"... I am a single parent and head of my household. I am also a recovering alcoholic of four years. Some of my challenges are with balancing work, counseling, meetings, and raising my daughter. Receiving help from Brother Benno's gives me strength when faced with all my every-day financial obligations. I am so grateful, and I thank God every day for having programs like this to help me better my life. I pray for the day when I can help people who are in my shoes. R.A."

Many of them returned on December 22 to help distribute the toys. They also donated 250 teen gifts, a project organized by "Angel" Carol Richards.

Many Marines also gave us their time by helping to distribute toys. **Herb Robertson** stayed the entire day, passing out stuffed animals. He looked so handsome in his dress uniform, and his presence reminded us that our soldiers are making sure our freedom and safety are secured.

Many churches, other companies, and individuals gave us their time and treasures, including the City of Oceanside. We couldn't have done it without all of you!

He was an ex-Marine and had just lost his civilian job a few weeks earlier. His girlfriend was expecting a baby soon, and his mom and sister were barely making ends meet.

They had all come to the Center earlier that day, and he said they so enjoyed the refreshments, Christmas carols, Santa, gifts, and loving atmosphere that they left with a feeling of hope. "Yeah," he said. "Today was our Christmas!"

All these Angels accomplished what they set out to do!
