I am writing thank-you notes, a few each day, for the heartfelt response we had for our toy needs. To think that we started with "0" and were able to provide a really nice gift for over 2,100 children! We gave each child a stuffed animal plus a few stocking stuffers as well.

On December 21, cars and trucks continuously came by with donations. As we received each load, we were just plain excited! Even after hours, when we were in the dining room figuring out the final plan, a lady knocked on the door and presented us with 100 \$10 gift certificates from Target. They were perfect for our teen boys. And Brother Benno's Auxiliary made over 200 cosmetic-filled totes for our teen girls.

The Thrift Shop collected toys and money for toys from hundreds of caring people. They "stuffed the truck" with approximately 300 toys. Many local groups came by with vehicles filled to capacity with really nice toys. One of our own staff members collected toys plus \$200 in cash at his gym. We went on a fun shopping spree with that money, and with many other generously given dollars.

We watched the papers incessantly for good deals and coupons. At one shop, we filled two carts three times, because they gave us coupons we could use on future purchases (\$20 off on every \$30 we spent!). My five-year-old neighbor boy came up to give me two brand-new

EIGHT-YEAR-OLD INITIATES HELP FOR THE HOMELESS

More than a year ago, seven-year-old **Drake Pytlak** of Oceanside saw a homeless man standing in front of a Walmart store, asking for help. He was moved to ask his mom **Rachelle** if they could help, and that concern became the beginning of Drake's determination to help those in need. They went into Walmart and bought all kinds of things they thought the man could use, and his mom said Drake felt very good about it. So good, in fact, that this past Halloween he asked his mother not to buy him any Christmas gifts, but to give that money to the poor instead.

Now Drake is eight and in third grade at Nichols Elementary School in Oceanside. He approached his teacher, **Charlie Bishop**, with his idea about asking all the students in the school to donate money and/or food for the homeless, and Charlie said he was happy to help.

During the month of December, the Nichols kids gave \$425 to the "Gift Up a Gift" campaign, with some of the donations as much as \$40. Another teacher, **Mrs. Bergman**, added \$159 from her Santa Gram fundraiser, for a grand total of \$584. "I think (our school's Christmas food drive) was our biggest food drive yet, which is pretty cool considering the state of the economy," said Mr. Bishop.

Denise Seymour, Dennis Martinek, Dennis Pinnick, and Luke from Brother Benno's went to Nichols Elementary on December 16, where they were presented with a check. "The kids were delightful," said Denise, "and the teachers were so wonderful in supporting this idea."

She wasn't able to return the money to the restaurant because it had gone out of business, so she chose to give the money—\$500—to Brother Benno's instead.


