KEEPING TRACK OF HOW WE HELP OUR COMMUNITY

We are often asked about our services at Brother Benno's. Who do we serve? What types of services do we offer? What needs are unmet?

We migrated to our new database, Mission Tracker, in early summer of 2021, which helps us to answer these questions. Some generous benefactors helped the Foundation to fund this new resource. Since that time, our intake staff has been hard at work entering our Guests into the system and producing plastic ID cards with photographs, which allow them to obtain resources such as food, clothing, diapers, backpacks, tarps, and other supplies. The resources also include services like rental and utility assistance, bus passes, temporary shelter assistance, and gas vouchers.

Part of this migration to Mission Tracker was due to a requirement by the City of Oceanside that Brother Benno's provide those we serve with "a plastic or laminated photo ID card that will be used for entry into the facility." (Item No. 39 of Conditional Use Permit between City of Oceanside and the Brother Benno Foundation, updated in March 2021).

Getting this database set up and training our team how to utilize it has taken some time. We continue to add more data and services each month, such as items of clothing being distributed, and each case and payments for rental and utility assistance. Our community outreach team keeps track of the services we provide, which includes detailed case notes that document progress, and actions to provide shelter, medical and mental health care, and financial aid to our homeless Guests. We are adding data about the

number of food boxes and food bags we distribute each month.

More and more information will be available so that we can share our story with you, assess our performance, and better manage our services. All this information also helps us to apply for grants. We are grateful for the efforts of our volunteers and staff who have assisted with the implementation and expanded use of Mission Tracker.

We are pleased to announce that we have entered more than 2,000 people into Mission Tracker as of the writing of this article. We continue to add new individuals who need assistance almost every day. Brother Benno's is grateful that we can continue to serve and provide resources to those most in need of help. We cannot do this without your support. Thank you.

Brother Benno's is fortunate to have a group of volunteers filling key positions, and a dedicated staff committed to serving persons in need. Three key volunteer positions are currently open.

Human Resource: An experienced Human Resource professional is needed to manage the human resource needs of our volunteers and staff. This is a part-time position reporting to our Board of Directors.

Grant Writer: This position is responsible for drafting applications as a member of our grant-writing team. Good writing skills and experience is writing proposals is preferred. Grant writers have the benefit of working closely with the Brother Benno staff and volunteers in drafting detailed and compliant applications. They especially find it rewarding to work with team members in securing financial support for the services provided to those in need.

IT Professional: An experienced IT Professional is needed for the overall management of the IT functions at Brother Benno's.

Most duties for the above positions can be performed off-site, with some duties performed at the Brother Benno Center. BROTHER BENNO AUXILIARY COMES TO AN END

Joyce Cerimele, most recent President of the Brother Benno Auxiliary, has announced that the Auxiliary formally disbanded in January after 25 years of service to the Foundation. It was started by Dixie Bales*, who was the Secretary of the Brother Benno Board of Directors at the time, as the fundraising arm of the Foundation.

Six charter members have continued to be part of the Auxiliary all these years: Alma Boone, Daniel Boone, Maureen Hartin, Debbie Knight, Colleen O'Harra, and JoAnne Shlemmer.

Joyce stated that in addition to raising money, Auxiliary members served in other endeavors such as the Breakfast Club (a morning serving team), Thrift Shop volunteering, Knitting Group, Layette Group, Postal Carriers Food Drive, Children's Christmas Party, and the Golf Tournament.

Board member **Helen Parsons**, a long-time Auxiliary member, reminisced about her experiences with the group. "Our Fashion Show was quite the social event in Oceanside each year," she said. "It was held at Camp Pendleton for years, and hundreds of tickets would sell out months ahead of time. At my very first one, I was asked by Karen Gallagher to go to the entrance and help Kay Kutler hug the incoming guests, as she was 'holding up the show.' I approached Kay, introduced myself, and told her I would help her hug. She was delighted and placed me right beside her. All guests then received two hugs instead of one. The show started late!"

Helen said that the Auxiliary's Cookie Booth at the annual Carlsbad Street Faire was her absolute favorite event. "We were allowed to bake cookies at home, take them to the Center where we put three big cookies in each bag, then sell them at the Faire," she said. "We sold hundreds, and we got the word out to the public about who and what Brother Benno's was all about. It was a sad day when we could not bake our own cookies any more (state regulations, certified kitchens only)."

Board President Kathleen Diehlmann has said that the Golf Tournament fundraiser will continue in 2022, and Joyce Cerimele has volunteered to help with the gift card donations for the Children's Christmas Party in 2022.


