



MAMI IS IN NEED OF REPAIRS

Brother Benno's House of Martha Ann Mary and Ida (MAMI) has been a safe haven for homeless women and women with children for many years. It is considered a transitional home—a sanctuary, a refuge, a place where the women can regain their equilibrium and can earn enough money to move into some kind of affordable housing. Total capacity is seven residents plus the House Manager, and it is often full. At the present time, two moms and two children are living there.

While the women and children live at MAMI, everything is provided for them—food, clothing, bus passes, and whatever else they might need. The women must have a job or be actively looking for one, and they have to be saving money toward future living arrangements. They are given help with things like money management and child rearing, so that when they leave MAMI, they'll be better equipped to make it on their own.

MAMI is a warm, comfortable old house in Oceanside, lovingly cared for by Brother Benno volunteers and Program Members, the Manager, and the women themselves. But like most old houses, it is now in dire need of major repairs. Because of termite and dry rot damage, all the wood siding on the rear of the house must be removed, the termite damage repaired, and then new stucco applied. The cost will probably run around \$7,000.

As we have mentioned in previous newsletters, Brother Benno's has been struggling financially because of higher food prices and fewer donations, so this added expense will stretch the Foundation even further. Once again, we are

Brother Benno's 36 Program Members were honored with a Christmas lunch at the Center on December 14. One man, "Adam," was honored for his 19 years of sobriety, as well as his service to the Brother Benno Foundation. **Harold Kutler** introduced him by saying: "Nineteen years ago, this guy roared up to Brother Benno's on his motorcycle. He was covered with tattoos, and his attitude was—well, let's say—not exactly like the man we know now."

Adam said that at the time he had no idea he'd still be around the Center 19 years later. "He eventually became the bridge between Brother Benno's and the guys 'out there,'" Harold said. He knew everyone, especially those living in the riverbed, and he became—and still is—someone the Guys can look up to and learn from. The crowd attested to that honor with at least three standing ovations for him.

Disaster Averted. Thanksgiving this year offered yet another opportunity for us to experience the goodness of the community. Usually the turkeys for our big dinner are roasted in the huge ovens at the Prince of Peace Abbey on the hill above Highway 76, as we have only a few small ovens at the Center. But this year, some of the Abbey's ovens were malfunctioning, so we suddenly had a whole bunch of uncooked turkeys close to mealtime. A few phone calls solved the problem. Stepping up to help were Calvary Chapel and Calvary Baptist Churches in Oceanside, and about a dozen Brother Benno volunteers and church members who offered to cook a turkey or two in their own kitchens. Kids Pitch In. For the second year in a row, according to Servant of the Poor Liz Windle, students from St. John's School in Encinitas prepared Thanksgiving boxes for our families in need. The boxes contained the complete fixings for a holiday meal, along with hand-decorated placemats and cards with messages from the children.

Work Is Fun! A couple weeks before Christmas, a group of students from Fallbrook High School's special ed class came to the Center to make one hundred sandwiches, and to draw Christmas decorations on as many lunch bags, to be given out the next day to our Guests. If their joking and laughter were any indication, they were having a very good time while performing a needed service.

Rotarians' Service. The Rotary Club of Carlsbad has been especially supportive of the work of Brother Benno's for years, and this past year has been no exception. They have sent a serving team the third Thursday of every month for nine years; and in 2011, they donated \$11,530. Part of that money came in December as a check for \$1,200 and an additional \$1,200 worth of food (16 nine-pound hams, cans of corn, potatoes, and pineapple).

Ursula Monaco-Sweeney, the Club's Director of Community Service, singled out Belynn Gonzales for her generosity to Brother Benno's, saying she often drops off leftover food from her catering service. "On Thanksgiving, she brought in 20 humongous pumpkin pies," Ursula said. "Which reminds me," she added. "I was part of a blanket drive in December at St. Patrick Church in Carlsbad, and we gave 185 blankets to Brother Benno's," (20 of which were especially for children).

Final Report? What started in April 2011 as a modest goal by members of the First Presbyterian Church of Oceanside of knitting 25 scarves for Brother Benno's grew to 205 scarves and 71 hats by the end of the year! They had help from others in the community and even a few from out-of-town and out-of-state. And these energetic knitters aren't relegating their needles to the back of the drawer; they plan to continue into this new year. What a great gift, especially for our homeless Guests.

Solid Math. Math has never been my strong suit, but I do know this: One can of food from one hundred people equals one hundred cans of food. No donation is ever too small.
