CHRISTMAS "MAGIC" AT BROTHER BENNO'S

You never know how the magic of Christmas will play out at Brother Benno's. Something special always happens, and this year was no exception.

The "big event" started on December 18, when about 40 volunteers filled bags with toys for approximately 600 families. The parents had been given vouchers after Thanksgiving, on which they could write the age and sex of their children. On the 18th, they handed over their voucher to a volunteer, who walked through the warehouse loaded with toys that had been placed on tables according to "boy" or "girl," and the appropriate age. An estimated two thousand toys were distributed. The process worked like clockwork, but the joyful chatter of the volunteers was just as evident as the precision of their work.

While toy bags were being filled, the parents and their children were treated to cookies* and punch, as well as entertainment.**

According to **Denise Seymour**, our Volunteer Co-ordinator, several families came to the Center the following day, saying they'd been unable to come on the 18th. "One mother ended up with a musical guitar that I felt would be appropriate for her little boy," Denise said. "She told me, as I walked her out to her car, that he had been asking for a guitar—and she was so pleased!"

Christmas Day, about 250 people came for the traditional dinner of turkey, dressing, potatoes, gravy, broccoli, rolls, pie, cake, coffee, and punch. Instead of the regular Wednesday serving team, the Guests were served by a group of various Christmas volunteers. **Suzy Martinek**, one of our faithful long-time volunteers, shared this story: "I had a middle-aged woman and her mother volunteer. It was their first time here. At

the end of the meal, the mom said to me, 'I am 88 years old, and I have always wanted to do something like this. This has been my most blessed Christmas of my whole life.' She signed up for next year. I guess she is a positive thinker!"

The music on Christmas Day was provided by an extended family of 15 who range in age from three to eighty, and who have been entertaining our Guests for the past several years. They are of Hawaiian heritage, and they play Christmas music on a variety of instruments.

*Stars. A group of approximately 20 home-schooling families in Vista formed a Cookie Ministry last year in an effort to bring Christmas cheer to the less fortunate in our midst. Led by Joy Highley, Yvonne Hamnquist, and Janette Mclintock, they bake cookies, package them, and deliver them to the Brother Benno Center for distribution to the families who are picking up new toys before Christmas.

This year, the Home Schooling Group baked more than 4,800 cookies! "We ask how many they think they'll need," Joy said, "and then we double the number." After they were distributed at Brother Benno's, the group was able to give quite a few to Solutions for Change as well.

The families bake the cookies at home, then they gather at the Vista Masonic Lodge to package them. "The moms put them in bags and tie them with a ribbon," Joy said, "and the kids put stickers and labels with a Bible verse on the outside. It's really quite a production!" The parents remind the children that Christmas is every day, and not everyone has the advantages they have.

**More Stars. The entertainment for the families picking up toys on December 18 was provided by Robbie Furman and Eddie Medrano. Robbie was one of our lay ministers back in 2000. When he left Brother Benno's, he moved back east to start a successful "balloon animal" business. Each year he comes back to share his talents with our Guests and to visit with many of our staff members and volunteers. Eddie is a professional entertainer going by the name of Funny Eddie. He's a former clown with the Ringling Brothers Circus, and his skills include magic, balloon art, juggling, and comedy.

What a treat it was for everyone to have these talented men share their gifts with us!

Bless the Bikers! Two sober motorcycle clubs, the **Pioneers** and **Messengers**, hold a yearly benefit ride for the homeless through St. Vincent de Paul's and Brother Benno's. The bikers meet for breakfast and registration (a \$10 donation) at San

Diego Harley in San Diego, then have a party after the ride at Kennedy's Custom Cycle located very near our Center. In addition to the Clubs' donations of blankets and jackets, Brother Benno's was the recipient of an additional \$1,000 donated anonymously during the event.

Shop Sales Translate to Help. The Brother Benno Thrift Shop on Mission Avenue in Oceanside made a few dollars shy of \$5,000 on Small Business Saturday recently. "With everything 20% off, that's a lot of inventory!" said Shop Manager Michelle Hoppe. Denise Seymour let the Shop staff know how some of that money helped our Guests: It kept a mother of three safe in a hotel for a week from an abusive father, and buy diapers for her little ones. It paid back a staff member who helped a woman living in her disabled car to get the car repaired so she could drive to Atlanta where a job was waiting for her. And it provided diapers for another mother of three whose husband wasn't able to support his family that week. These stories are just a few examples of what happens at Brother Benno's six days a week, all year long.

Abundant Roses. Speaking of the Thrift Shop, we had to hold over one of **Helen Parsons**' "Roses" recipients in the December newsletter because we ran out of space. So here it is:

"To our Thrift Shop staff and volunteers: A life surrounded by flowers for all of you each day! Our mission statement, to serve the poor one sale at a time, is a reality because of your unwavering devotion. You do what needs to be done, no matter what, including washing floors, scrubbing bathrooms, washing windows, baking goodies for special events, attending events that let people know who we are, embracing students who want to do community service. You are simply the best! You are the wind (spirit) beneath my (Brother Benno's) wings!"


