NO ROOM IN THE INN

Brother Benno's helps many people each month with rent and prescriptions when we have enough funds to do so. We go out of our way to help when people are faced with emergencies, particularly when children are involved. One such situation occurred before Christmas.

A mother and her two children, ages three and nine, had been living in their car for four months. The three-year-old has autism, which manifests itself as hyperactivity. The mother was exhausted.

The family had been using Brother Benno's for food, showers, and clothing. Their car had major problems, and the repair would have cost far more than they could afford. The mother had used up all of her savings, except for \$100. All the local shelters that take women with children were full and had waiting lists. "There was no room in the inn."

Without their car, and no shelter with room for them, they had nowhere to go. Given those circumstances, the Brother Benno staff got involved, surrounding the family with special care and love. Thanks to your donations, we were able to use money from our emergency "Changing Life" reserve fund to help with the auto repair. We also provided temporary shelter for the family while the car was being repaired.

The staff contacted Operation Hope and Solutions for Change for help. Despite being full, Operation Hope was able to put them up for a short time, and Solutions for Change graciously agreed to take the family in a few weeks later. There, they'll have a place to live, and the mother will get counseling until she can get back on her feet. When she got the key back to her repaired

car, she could not believe all that we had done for her.

This story seems to fit in well with the story of Christmas. Our collective efforts allowed this vulnerable family to have a safe and secure Christmas. We are so grateful to all of our donors. Without your help, we could not have made this happen.

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A JOLT OF JOY

Back from a week-long visit to Brother Benno's in Oceanside. Part of the week I was in the Soup Kitchen, serving food or coffee. Morgan Williams did the face painting, which she said she loves to do because it makes people happy. She had two pages of drawings for the kids to choose from; and the smiles on their faces, when she held up a mirror so they could view her artwork, was proof that her goal had been achieved. Sonia Davidson and her two sons were the balloon artists, creating animals that sometimes popped and died before their time!

Rising above the happy chatter was the guitar music of **Tom Troy**, whose musical name is Troubadour Tom. He said he plays mostly environmental folk music "with a little Christmas music thrown in" for parties. He likes to promote "a kinder, gentler world" with his music, he said. Those that needed to be mailed out of town were set aside. In addition to paying the postage, this loving group of ladies also donated all the wrapping paper and other supplies.


