Volunteers Making a Difference January 2016



LOVE AND PRAYERS TOUCH THE HEARTS OF OUR GUESTS

What could show more love than the gift of a soft, hand-sewn, flannel pillowcase? Brother Benno's homeless Guests receive such a gift every Christmas, thanks to Girlfriends Care.

A team of women and teens sew the pillowcases, which are then taken to groups of children, each of whom prays specifically for the person who will receive the pillowcase. They also decorate the labels with encouraging words, a drawing, a verse, or a combination of all three. The kids add their first name and age so there's a personal connection.

"Over the years, I have seen grown men cry that a child would take the time for them," said **Ellen Clark**, who heads the Pillowcase Project. One man, she said, carried the case, somehow with a pillow, all around town and at the Center. Numerous Guests encourage one another to take a pillowcase because "they come with a prayer."

"(And) this teaches the kids about prayer as a gift," Ellen said.

Ellen's favorite story happened about five years ago: "A Guest declined a case because he had his from last year. When my son and I encouraged him to take a fresh one, he told us, 'I couldn't. The boy who prayed for me spelled Jesus wrong, and I pray for him at least three times a week.'... Then a year later, he came back and said, 'My case finally fell apart this year, so I need a new one.""

"(We are) giving to the poorest of our neighbors, those who feel the least loved," Ellen said.

2015 was the eighth year that Girlfriends Care have distributed pillowcases at Brother Benno's. One woman who received a case said, "Tell the children they touched my heart. It made me cry." And a man said, "Tell the kids an old soldier said Thank You!"

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GUESTS RECEIVE ASSISTANCE FOR SPECIAL NEEDS

Brother Benno's has two volunteer case workers—**Bill Harper** and **Mary Holguin**—who work with Guests needing help paying for items on a short-term basis. This assistance includes rent, utilities, prescriptions, gas, bus passes, and emergency overnight motel stays.

They stress that help is available only when there are sufficient funds, and that there are strict guidelines which must be met by those receiving such assistance. Looking at October and November of 2015, we see how many Guests were served in each category:

Rental assistance is for one month, and the Guest must have a firm solution in place in order to make his/her future payments. During those two months, we served 85 Guests.

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EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Blanket Alert! For years, Brother Benno's has been fortunate to receive blankets for our homeless Guests from the government. That windfall has apparently come to an end, so we are asking our supporters to please donate throw-sized blankets that are warm and easy to carry around. Many stores hold end-of-the-year sales, so you can check and see if blankets are part of those sales.

That's Entertainment. I had the pleasure of meeting C. C. Sanders one Saturday morning at the Center, where he was preparing to entertain our Guests with his Oldies But Goodies repertoire of songs many of us can't resist.

C. C. told me he came to Oceanside in 1963 as a Marine; and after leaving the military, he served 18 years as an Oceanside Police Officer. It was in his duties as a policeman that he met Harold and Kay Kutler when Brother Benno's was housed in a small house in downtown Oceanside.

"I'm trained as a musician and public speaker," he said; and he added that he sometimes sang with Kay as she entertained the Guests who came to the Kitchen. His favorite duets with Kay were "Side by Side" and "Second-Hand Rose," which happened to be our beloved Brother Benno's favorite song!

The day I met C. C. was the first time he'd been back to Brother Benno's in years, but he already has plans for other gigs at the Center and the Thrift Shop. "I want to give back," he said, "because I've been so blessed in my life." He

continues his professional music career all around our area, often entertaining at hotels and country clubs. Besides Oldies but Goodies, his music includes Rock and Roll, Big Band, Country Western, and Rhythm and Blues.

Heartfelt Giving. In November, we received donations that were somewhat outside the norm-in a good way!

The St. Vincent de Paul Conference at San Rafael Parish in Rancho Bernardo brought in eight huge plastic bags filled with ALL NEW clothing-underwear, socks, men's jeans, light-weight jackets, and sweatshirts. According to Joanna McClure, who coordinated the drive, "We collected them from the parish so that your Guests can have NEW items, as I'm sure most get hand-medowns."

Before they could deliver the clothing to Brother Benno's, Joanna's home was burglarized (she and her husband were at church); and the thief stole three dozen pairs of the new jeans!

"We have purchased more," Joanna said, "and with the help of friends, we (had) about 40 pairs to give you."

Another somewhat unusual outreach came in the form of donation drives initiated by Elizabeth Lehner, a realtor in Carlsbad. She sent out flyers to her neighbors in the Bressi Ranch area, telling them briefly about Brother Benno's, and asking them to set out donations on their driveways to be picked up on a particular day. And she also had a drive at her son's Montessori School in Vista

In addition to all the donated items-new and used clothing, food, hygiene products, and toys-the children at the school made 100 Thanksgiving placemats.

We thank Joanna and Elizabeth for taking the initiative on behalf of Brother Benno's.

Utilities assistance (gas, electric, water) has the same requirements as rent. We helped 55 families.

Prescription assistance is given only one time, and never for narcotic drugs. Nine guests received help.

Bus passes were given to five Guests, gas vouchers of \$20 each to three.

Motel vouchers are offered for one to three nights, and 21 people received a voucher during October and November.

Rental and utility assistance keeps families safe and prevents them from becoming homeless, and motel vouchers give short-term relief to homeless individuals. Bus passes and gas vouchers help Guests get to job interviews and medical appointments, as well as to agencies that can offer further help.

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Brother Benno's is in great need of a volunteer grant writer, or someone willing to be trained as a grant writer. If you are interested, please call Denise Seymour (760-439-1244, ext. 104).


