BROTHER BENNO'S RECEIVES HIGHEST POSSIBLE RATING!

The Brother Benno Foundation has received a rating of four stars, the highest possible rating among charitable groups in the United States, from Charity Navigator!

BROTHER BENNO'S GETS NEW REFRIGERATOR TRUCK



After a successful ten-month campaign to raise funds, Brother Benno's recently purchased a new refrigerator truck to transport donations of food from area stores and restaurants. The fundraising efforts started with a \$16,000 grant from the Oceanside Charitable Foundation and a \$10,000 neighborhood development grant from the San Diego County Board of Supervisors. Many individual donations made up the difference.

Food donations are received from Alberson's, Costco, Vons, Stater Brothers, Trader Joe's, Sprouts, Ralphs, Fresh 'n' Easy, French Bakery, Carlsbad Danish Bakery, Target, Walmart, Starbucks, Chipotle, Pizza Hut, KFC, Red Lobster, and North County Vending. It is estimated that picking up these donations saves us more than \$100,000 every year in food purchases.

WOMAN WHO LOST EVERYTHING NOW ENJOYS "NORMAL LIFE"

(Last month we featured "Kris," who lived the first 40 years of her life in the darkness of drugs, poverty, and violence. This month you'll read about "Claire," whose life was "stable and ordinary" until she was 41, when she began using hard drugs. Both women credit Brother Benno's with their newfound lives of sobriety and peace.)

At age 48, "Claire" looks back on her growing-up years as being stable, with two caring parents, a nice home, good schools, and no real problems. She admits trying marijuana and alcohol when she was 14-something "everyone" was doing. She didn't like alcohol and still doesn't, but marijuana became a regular part of her life, even into adulthood.

She knows now that using marijuana wasn't a good thing, but she says it never interfered with her ability to do what needed to be done. She had a steady job for 19 years, always paid her bills, married, became a stay-at-home mom and took good care of her son.

On the outside, Claire said, they were a normal, happy family, but the marriage eventually ended in divorce. She married again; they had a daughter, bought a home, and she was able to take care of all the needs of her family. But this time the marriage floundered because her husband was an abusive alcoholic, and they split up.

Feeling stressed with having to take care of the children, make house and car payments on her own, and do everything else connected with being a single mom, Claire started hanging out with a couple who were heavy into smoking meth; and she decided to try it herself.

That was seven years ago, and her life quickly spiraled down in every way. She could no longer hold down a job, so she sold meth in order to make house payments and buy food. The police got wind of her drug selling, raided her house, and put her in jail. CPS took her daughter away from her, she lost her home, her car, and all her possessions-everything-including furniture, clothing, and mementos.

When her jail sentence was completed,

providence stepped in, but Claire didn't know it. What she did know was that she was being offered the opportunity to participate in Drug Court, a very strict 18-month program that promised she wouldn't have to do prison time if she adhered to the court requirements, which included attending court meetings five days a week, having random drug tests (usually four or five a week at first), and appearing in court once a week to have her case reviewed. Failing any of these requirements would put her back in jail; and if she were to qualify for Drug Court again, she'd have to start over at the beginning.

Being part of Drug Court, Claire had to live in a sober-living residence*, and the one she was assigned to was a Brother Benno House. She was picked up at the jail by one of our Program leaders. Her entire worldly possessions were a pair of flip-flops and the clothes she was wearing.

Claire graduated from Drug Court in February, 2015. She says it was the 18 months of knowing she had a place to live, being surrounded by like-minded people who were working toward important goals, and having mentors close at hand at all times that has made it possible for her to turn her life around. "The only people I associate with now are people in recovery," she said. "You can't be around users; they suck the life out of you. I know, because that's what I did to others when I was using."

Claire has had a regular job for a year and a half. She moved out of the Brother Benno House when she graduated from Drug Court and now rents a studio, where for the past several months her daughter has been able to be with her every other weekend. "I have my daughter back in my life. That was one of my main goals," she said. She sees her son often, too. "A lot of what I do is for my kids. They need me, and now they know they can trust me, depend on me. When I say I'm going to do something, I do it. We get together at my place to watch movies, and sometimes we go hiking. I'm really enjoying having a normal life."

She attends AA meetings regularly, even

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BROTHER BENNO'S RECEIVES GRANT FOR HUMANITARIAN SERVICES

Genentech Foundation has awarded The Brother Benno Foundation \$75,000 to help in our work with homeless individuals and low-income families in North San Diego County. The funds will be used to provide food, clothing, emergency prescription assistance, tarps, blankets, and bus transportation to medical appointments.

Genentech is a biotechnology company headquartered in South San Francisco, with a manufacturing facility in Oceanside, California. A spokesperson at Genentech stated: "We are compelled to give back and make meaningful contributions to society. We believe that philanthropy fuels change, mentoring makes a difference, and many sets of hands are better than one. The grant will help provide funds that will be used to serve more than 200 Guests a free hot breakfast six days a week at our Center. Guests are also provided showers, haircuts, clothing, mail service, and food boxes.

According to The Brother Benno Foundation Board President **Dennis Martinek**, that fact that over 200 volunteers give their time every month to carry out a wide variety of jobs was a significant factor in gaining the grant. The grant will be used to carry out the Foundation's motto of "**Uplifting the dignity of those we serve**" by providing necessities to those in need. "We are very appreciative of Genentech's generous support," he added.

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though her addiction was to a narcotic, because the Program leaders at Brother Benno's invited her to join them and the other residents at the Houses. "I like AA meetings," she said, "and I like being part of that community."

Claire has been honest with her children. They know about her drug life, and what that involved. But they also know about Brother Benno's, and how much she was—and still is—helped by so many people. She has brought both her son and daughter to the Center, where they've volunteered together. "They need to know about service to oth-

ers," Claire said, "and we love coming here."

*(Brother Benno's sober-living Houses are now called Program Houses. Like our Men's Program, the women now follow the AA model of the 12 Steps.)


