PROGRAM GRADUATE FOUND WHAT HAD ALWAYS BEEN LACKING

"It was a God thing," "Ben" said. "That's all I can say."

What Ben was referring to was the story about how he ended up at Brother Benno's, and how a "chance encounter" at the age of 37 led to the fulfilling life he is now living.

His growing-up years were pretty typical of the men and women we see in the Brother Benno Recovery Program—parents divorced, mother working a lot, kids left on their own, an abusive step-father, and his unwitting drift into the drug scene.

Although Ben was able to string together months of sobriety, it never lasted, because he was trying to do it on his own. He left his home state, thinking a complete change of scenery might be the answer. But of course it wasn't. After wandering around California for a year, panhandling for money and traveling by bus, he ended up in San Diego.

On a Sunday morning in late 2015, he decided to see a movie; but when he got to the theater, he discovered there was a church service going on (the congregation rented the theater before movies began). Oh well, he thought, might as well go to that first. After the service, he felt moved to talk to the pastor, who saw Ben's desperation and urged him to go to Brother Benno's in Oceanside for help.

"I slept on the sidewalk outside your door that Sunday night," Ben said, "so I'd be here when the doors opened Monday morning." He had an interview with a staff member and was told he could hang around for a few days and do some volunteer work—cleaning up around the property, cleaning the restrooms. And he continued to sleep outdoors.

"I guess they wanted me to prove myself, to see if I was serious about getting help," he said. He was accepted into the Recovery Program; and for the first time in his life, he felt he had the guidance and encouragement that had always been lacking in his life.

"If you're ready to change your life, this Program will teach you how to be sober, how to be grateful. There's always somebody there to guide you," he said. Because it's based on the 12 Steps of AA, he has a sponsor, he goes to meetings, and he continues to work the Steps.

On the day he graduated from the Program in June 2016, he got word that he got the job he'd applied for. It didn't take long for him to get raises and even a special commendation, which he proudly shows to the men who are currently in the Program. "I'm not bragging," he said, "I just want them to see what's possible."

After graduating, he lived in one of our transitional houses for five months, then in a sober-living house for another four. Now he's in his own apartment and is making car payments (he said with a grin).

Ben admits that he had very little contact with his mother and brother and sister for about 25 years. He did keep in touch with his father, mostly when he needed money. Now all that has changed. He calls his mother at least once a month. And when he spent several days with his father recently, he got the best possible gift from him: "My dad told me, 'If I were young, you would be someone I wanted to hang out with; I'd want you for a friend.""

EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Health Service. The San Diego County Health Center came to Brother Benno's early in June and again at the end of the month to vaccinate our homeless Guests for Hepatitus A. They set up a table on the sidewalk in front of the Center, where men and women could voluntarily receive the shot. On the first day, 52 Guests were vaccinated, and the second day was scheduled with the hope of reaching those not available the first time. In six months, they'll come again to give the recommended second shot.

Wheelchairs. If you look at the list of Needs on page 5, you'll see wheelchairs this month. It's surprising how many of our Guests are in need of one, either for a temporary problem or on a permanent basis. I sometimes see them wheeling down the street after our morning meal, and I've been told by a few of them that they come to the Center on the bus. Others are being pushed by family members or friends who have their own transportation. In any case, a wheelchair can make the difference between getting no help or being able to show up at Brother Benno's!

It Doesn't Take Much. Volunteer Frank Doherty shared a touching story recently. He said a homeless man came up to him with some much-knotted shoe laces in his hand. Every time they broke, he tied them together one more time. Frank told him to hold on; he'd find him some new shoelaces. He went into our Clothing Room, "borrowed" the laces from a donated pair of shoes, and gave them to the man. "You'd have thought I gave him a million dollars," Frank said. FOR BROTHER BENNO'S, IT'S JUST NORMAL CONCERN

He called himself "Odz," a nickname that seemed to fit his flamboyant personality. He was a regular at Brother Benno's, coming for breakfast every morning, then hanging out with other homeless Guests. After not seeing him for a couple weeks, staff members and volunteers were shocked and saddened when they learned he was in the hospital, dying from lung cancer.

One of our volunteers, **Brother Kevin Dismas Moshier, FSP**, said, "In spite of his circumstances, Odz was a joyful soul, and he had a way of lifting people up. Sometimes I'd see him running along the road, wrapped in a blanket, looking happy."

Carol Muehe, who runs our Clothing Room, told a story about a donated pair of cowboy boots that Odz just had to have. "I reminded him that he'd just been given a pair of shoes recently, so he couldn't have another pair so soon," she said. Odz then pleaded his case to Staff member Dennis Pinnick, who relayed the request to Carol. Carol said that weakened her resolve. "OK, Odz, the boots are yours," she told him.

Dennis observed Odz's concern for other people one day when a taxi drove up to Brother Benno's and a homeless man in bad shape got out. The Center had already closed, so Odz told Dennis, "No problem. I'll take care of him." He took the man to his sleeping place, gave him some food, and brought him back to the Center the next morning, where he received further help. "It's just the way Odz was," Dennis said, "always concerned for others."

Odz knew that a nephew and his wife lived nearby, but he kept his own whereabouts a secret from them until he was in the hospital near death. Then he asked hospital personnel to call them, and through the niece, to contact Brother Benno's.

"As soon as we heard, another staff member and I went to see him," Dennis said. "And shortly after, Brother Kevin arrived." "I prayed with him," Brother Kevin said, "and in less than an hour he looked at me, smiled, and died." Brother also conducted a memorial service at St. Francis Catholic Church in Vista, where a group from Brother Benno's was in attendance.

Odz's niece expressed gratitude for the obvious concern shown by those from Brother Benno's. But for them, it's just a normal part of the care they provide every day for those who have nowhere else to turn.


