SERVING OTHERS IS KEY TO SUCCESS

The success of the men and women who change their lives by way of Brother Benno's Recovery Program is a sign of hope for anyone who thinks their situation is hopeless. Its strength lies in its adherence to the principles of AA, but there's more.

"Laurie" said she hit bottom when she had to spend six months in jail for selling drugs. "Jail was horrible, just horrible," she said. "I think I had to go through that to finally come to the point where I was ready to make changes in my life."

When she was released from jail at age 40, she'd been clean and sober for eight months, and she felt she needed some kind of support system to stay that way. She'd heard about Brother Benno's and made an appointment to come in and meet with the mentors. At first they told her they didn't take anyone who wasn't just starting out on the path to sobriety, but something about her determination apparently made them change their minds. And for Laurie, it was the best thing that ever happened to her. She graduated from the Program in June of 2017, and her life continues on the new path she set for herself.

A big part of our Recovery Program involves the requirement that the men and women work at the Center and/or Thrift Shop in exchange for room and board. "That's how I learned what a joy it is to be of service," she said. "Before, I was a snob—I couldn't be bothered with other people's problems. But here at Brother Benno's, everyone cares about everyone else, and I just did what I saw everyone else doing."

Her first assignment at the Center was to help in the Clothing Room. Because **Carol Muehe**, who's in charge of clothing, hugged everyone who came in, Laurie did the same. "I just stood in the doorway and hugged!" she said. "And that's how it all started."

Now, she can't imagine not being part of Brother Benno's and continuing to reach out to others. "I am a Brother Benno Family Member!" she said. She comes in at least once a week, just to be there for any Guests who need a kind word—and a hug. She's changed her whole attitude toward other people, and an unexpected benefit is the change in her teenage son, who was struggling in school due to his unstable family life. Now he's getting very good grades and is thriving in other ways as well. She has two other children, plus a baby granddaughter, and they've become a family again.

After graduating from the Program, Laurie and her son were able to get housing with Solutions for Change, where she was also hired for a temporary job in their fund-raising department. She found that she really enjoyed that kind of work and is looking for permanent employment, hopefully with another non-profit agency, because she is so thrilled with being of service to others.

The changes in Laurie's life attest to the truth of a saying attributed to the Dalai Lama: "Just as ripples spread out when a single pebble is dropped into water, the actions of individuals can have far-reaching effects." She imitated what she saw in others at Brother Benno's, and she now passes that on to those who are still struggling.

MORE MEMORIES OF HAROLD AND KAY

Nick Sauer. I joined the Board more than 30 years ago. . . . I heard that meals were being served at Brother Benno's in Oceanside, (so) I drove down to Minnesota and Cleveland one evening to check it out. I met Harold and Kay at that time and was totally impressed. They put me on the serving line right away.

My family and I came down to serve meals soon afterward. A short time later, Harold asked me to be on the Board. I had no special areas of responsibility; I did everything. (When) Harold had to leave town, I acted as President and Manager while he was away. The BBF (Brother Benno Foundation) was not very structured. The Board would sit around the kitchen table with Harold and Kay and work on ways to serve the poor.

Special experiences as a Board member usually involved direct services for the poor. Harold used to call it "service where the rubber meets the road." Several times I would go to court for the poor. Many times they were facing possible jail sentences. I am not a criminal attorney, but I worked without charge. I used to tell them before we went to court to "bring your toothbrush." Somehow they never needed it. I would tell the court that they were serving BBF and doing a great job. I would also tell the court that I was on the Board, and we would monitor their future community service if given a chance. The courts always approved. My "clients" were over-joyed. Several of them successfully completed our Recovery Program.

HISTORIC EVENT TOUCHES BROTHER BENNO'S

Board Member Nick Sauer and his siblings witnessed the posthumous presentation of the Silver Star to their brother, First Lieutenant Philip Sauer, USMCR, at Camp Pendleton on April 24, 2018, for his "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action against the enemy while serving with 1st Battalion, 9th Marines in the Republic of Vietnam on 24 April 1967."

A chance meeting between Philip's brother **Tom** and retired Marine Corps Lt. Col. **David Little** in 2015 on the beach in La Jolla started a long search by Little that ended with the decision by the Secretary of the Navy to recognize Philip's bravery. Only one man survived the attack, **William Marks**, who said that thanks to Philip, he became the father of two and grandfather of four.


