When I first came to the Brother Benno Foundation in 1999, I was your typical drug addict. My back was up against the wall, and I didn't want to go to prison (again). I also had a desire to change my lifestyle, or at least find a way to manage it better. I had been to programs before. Lots of programs.

Growing up in Los Angeles as a drug addict, and later as a drug dealer to support my habit, I had learned how to manipulate people in situations. I had also suffered the consequences of that lifestyle.

As I settled into the Brother Benno Recovery Program to "do my time," I noticed that the people overseeing the Center seemed concerned about the Guests who came in each day. There also seemed to be an abundance of food, clothing, financial assistance, and other items available. In fact, it seemed that every time someone with a genuine need would come through the door, they were provided for.

Most normal people seeing this would probably think, "Wow, what an incredible place!" As a drug addict, my thought was, "I wonder how much these people are making, they must be rich; and I wonder how I can get in on this."

I decided to investigate. I began to use my manipulative skills to get to know the Board members. I really thought I was being slick. Looking back on these experiences, I realize that most of those folks probably saw right through me and just loved me anyway.

Through my inquiries, I learned many things that transformed my thinking and eventually led to my own spiritual transformation.

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EXPERIENCING THE BROTHER BENNO SCENE

Volunteers From Afar. Hang out at Brother Benno's long enough, and you're sure to meet the most interesting people. One morning as I was about to leave the Center, I found myself in the middle of a large group of men and women in front of the building (16 of them, I discovered) who were talking and laughing but seemingly not sure what was coming next. It turned out they were waiting to take a tour of the Center, and volunteer Helen Parsons, tour guide extraordinaire, hadn't arrived yet.

I asked the two women closest to me who this group was, and they said they are a nationwide company, Strategy Source, a recruiting agency that finds executives for their clients. Once a year, they get together to plan for the coming year, and this year they chose Carlsbad as the base for this meeting. The motto of the company is "We Know People," and they decided that in order to know people, they need to serve people. That's where Brother Benno's came in.

In preparation for their meeting, one of their staff members used the Internet to find possible organizations that would welcome them to spend a day in service. She made numerous phone calls, only to come up empty. As a last resort, she called St. Patrick Church in Carlsbad, and she was encouraged to try Brother Benno's. And of course, we said "Yes!"

After the tour of the Center, they were directed to the Brother Benno Thrift Shop, where they spent several happy hours doing many of the endless jobs needed to keep the Shop running smoothly. Helen reported that "they rolled up their sleeves and worked non-stop sorting, lifting, organizing, etc. I hope they come back in the future!"

A Gift of Flowers. Some of the more unusual donations we receive are fresh flowers that come with food items given to us by many local markets. We often share them with Guests and volunteers; and Julie Petrie, who has volunteered in our Intake Office for eight years, delivers them to a nearby nursing home. She says the staff always greets her with big smiles and many thank-yous.

Be An Entertainer. Are you someone who loves to be with people, has a flair for being "on stage," and would be willing to donate a few hours a

week to entertain the people we serve? Our Guests come for breakfast Monday through Friday between 6 and 8:30 and Saturdays 10-11:30, and we want them to feel that Brother Benno's is a warm and loving place. Sing a song, strum a guitar, tell a joke, read a poem, ask if anyone is celebrating a birthday—these are just some of the things you might do to brighten their day. You set your schedule: i.e., every Monday, Tuesdays and Wednesdays—whatever you wish. A LESSON IN LOVE

Brother Benno's message of unconditional love for anyone who comes through our door results in our getting to know many of our Guests on a personal basis as we listen to their stories. Often we experience their plight and their pain, as well as the absolute beauty and love and compassion they have for the people around them. Here is one story of a 77-year-old man named Ben who was waiting in line for our Saturday brunch.

As I reached out to shake Ben's hand, I noticed he had a patch over his right eye. I asked him what happened. He said he'd been hit with a brick in the eye at 2 a.m. as he was sleeping in his camp. An apparently mentally ill man yelled out, "You are a Russian spy!" as he threw the brick at Ben's face.

Despite this major wound and lots of blood, Ben managed to call 911, then walked to the street where the ambulance could pick him up to take him to the hospital. The hospital staff called in an eye specialist, but they were unable to save the vision in that eye.

I was amazed to hear Ben's next statement: "I feel sorry for the man who threw the brick." He never said anything about his own grief and pain in being attacked and losing his vision. I was so impressed at his acceptance of his situation and his compassion and forgiveness of the man who perpetrated such a terrible act.

When I saw Ben the following week, I asked him how he became homeless. He said he had to sell his home in order to pay for his mother's nursing care while she was dying. He had been an electrician who could no longer work because of his age and associated medical problems.

The message of my encounter with Ben is that some of the most beautiful people we will ever meet are among the poor. We as human beings cannot ignore their suffering and are called to provide them with unconditional love. Being there for the poor and working at the margins (where people have acute needs) is where we often find the most meaning in life, and where we find ourselves doing what we are called by God to do—to love and serve the poor.

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I found out that the Brother Benno Board of Directors is a working board. That means they are INVOLVED with what happens, and most of them have multiple responsibilities. For instance, our current President, in addition to his responsibility on the Board, also drives a truck to pick up food donations each Friday. On other days he is our Safety Manager. He is not an exception, either. Each member carries a lot of responsibility beyond the Board room.

When I learned how much these folks did, my next question was, "These men and women must make a lot of money; I wonder how much?" When I found out that the Board members are volunteers and are not financially compensated, I was amazed. All my life I thought everyone was out to get as much as they could from others, and that people were very selfish. I certainly was.

Getting to know these good people with kind hearts was a turning point in my life. Their love and dedication to others gave me the desire to be a better person. I went through the Brother Benno Recovery Program three times to get to that point. The last time was 2010. I have been able to stay with the Foundation as a part-time Staff member since then.

It is an honor and a privilege to be able to work beside the men and women on our Board. Thank you all for your service!


