BROTHER BENNO'S FACES CHALLENGES REGARDING CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT

The City of Oceanside Planning Commission has been looking at Brother Benno's Conditional Use Permit (CUP) since October 2019 in response to complaints from several nearby businesses. These complaints concern loitering, littering, and over-night parking on the street in the business park.

A Standing Committee of the Commission put together their recommended changes to the CUP and presented them at a Zoom meeting on February 8, 2021. In addition to comments and questions from the six Commission members present (there is a total of seven members), 19 additional people spoke, almost all in support of the work done by Brother Benno's. Included in this group were representatives of the League of Women Voters and the ACLU, who strongly urged the Commission to focus on the many benefits provided to the City by Brother Benno's. Several speakers reminded everyone that "We must not criminalize homelessness."

Over the years, Brother Benno's has been aware of the problems caused by some of the people who come for help, and staff members and volunteers have been diligent in trying to address their neighbors' concerns. Various speakers at the meeting pointed out that helping men and women who are struggling with substance abuse and/or mental illness can be a long-term process, and putting time limits (as suggested in the revised CUP) are not only impossible but often counter-productive.

Marco Gonzalez, an attorney who is working pro bono to help Brother Benno's with this issue, wrote this comment to the Senior Planner at the City of Oceanside: "It is the experience of the Brother Benno's staff that 1-year is far too short a

period of time for a chronically homeless individual to negotiate the myriad forms, meetings, and general day-to-day challenges that must be overcome to rise out of homelessness. Indeed, it is not uncommon for individuals to require 3 or more years to get off the streets. Given the impending end of the COVID eviction moratoriums and the likely additional economic pressures until businesses fully reopen, it is more likely than not that we will see significant increase in the need for homeless services, including those as important as providing mail service to receive government assistance checks, applications, appointment notices, and the like."

One Commission member suggested that the City of Oceanside provide a safe area for overnight parking as other communities have done; the homeless who live in their vehicles do need a place to sleep.

Brother Benno's works regularly with the Oceanside Police Department's HOT Team—two police officers who are specially trained to work with the homeless—a partnership that has produced many successes.

The suggestions from the Standing Committee that were unacceptable to Brother Benno's were deleted, and the Commission voted on the new CUP—three in favor, three against. It was decided that the issue will be brought up again at the Planning Commission meeting on March 8 at 6 p.m. when all members will be present. This year's menu included steak and baked potatoes, and it was served on tables covered with tablecloths and Valentine symbols. Colorful bags of treats like home-made candies stood at each place, and big red hearts graced the walls.

Program mentors Jan Roberts and Jimmy Shlemmer spoke to the group, emphasizing how much the men and women are loved. It's the way Harold and Kay Kutler saw everyone who walked through the door, and how-by examplethey set the tone for every staff member and volunteer, right up to today.

FROM THE BOOK

In Harold Kutler's book, Soup Soap Hugs Hope, the Story of Brother Benno's Life-Changing Soup Kitchen, Harold Kutler had a chapter called "Our Recovery Program" in which he told the following story:

As Dolores stood in the boarding area of the airport with her son Ernest, she said to him, "Son, I've done everything I can do for you. Now you have to make it on your own." Mentally she added, God, he's in your hands.

Ernest had been discharged from the Marines a few years earlier but had never quite made the adjustment back to civilian life. His use of alcohol didn't help, nor did his mother's enabling. . . .

Five years went by, and Dolores heard nothing from Ernest, but she kept praying and hoping. To keep him alive in her heart, she started making a quilt she called "The Path." A path led to a circle in the middle, where she planned to place a bird starting to fly. "It would symbolize Ernest being set free to become the person God created him to be," she told us later.

Dolores also shared with us that she was able to work on the quilt only 15 or 20 minutes a day, because any longer was too emotionally painful. By the end of the fourth year, she could no longer bear to look at it and set it aside. But several months later, she felt an urgency to finish it.

Within a few hours of the quilt's completion, a letter arrived . . . from Ernest, reaching out to reconnect with his roots. "I cried and cried," she told us. "I felt like my dead son had come back to life. .

Back in Oceanside, he took up with his old buddies. Having a good time became his number one priority, and soon he was homeless. But eventually he found his way to Brother Benno's Kitchen, where he graduated from our program, then got a job and a place to live. We asked him why he waited five years to contact his mom.

"Well, the first two years I didn't have anything good to tell her," he said. "Then, as I started turning my life around, I was too embarrassed and full of guilt. I'd tell myself, 'next week,' but the weeks turned into months and the months into

years."

It was approaching Mother's Day that finally pushed Ernest into setting aside his fears and writing the letter.

We had the privilege of meeting with mother and son as part of their reunion. Such joy and love flowed during that meeting! I'll never forget it.

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In spring, geese head north, flying in a V formation. As each bird flaps its wings, it reduces wind resistance and cuts an easier path for the bird immediately following, allowing the flock to cover a greater distance than if each bird flew on its own.

Basic truth: People who share a common direction and sense of community get where they are going quicker and easier because they travel on the thrust of one another.


