Elana Bagley, one of our Program mentors, said she was thrilled with one person's donation (unfortunately she didn't get the person's name). There were six sets—two gold, two purple, and two green—colors that just happen to match the comforters in one of the Houses. With five additional sets donated, we've covered eleven of the 21 beds in our two Women's Houses.

God Speed, Good Friend! Speaking of Elana, we sadly said goodbye to her at the end of March, as she is in the process of moving out-of-state to be near her family. She's been a rock in our Recovery Program; and she's contributed to the Foundation in countless other ways with her expertise, her energy, and her unflinching commitment.

A Huge Contribution. As part of a Community Project assignment, eighth grade boys at Vista Magnet Middle School decided to collect health and hygiene products for the homeless, and they chose Brother Benno's as the place to donate them.

The boys started the project by raising funds at their school expo, selling items and baked goods that they made. They then met with their school district office and some local school principals to set up multiple hygiene product drives. With all this support, they were able to collect over 1,300 items, from which they put together 59 hygiene kits.

Deirdre Green, the mother of one of the boys, said, "The kits and remaining products were proudly donated to Brother Benno's." When asked how they knew about Brother Benno's, Deirdre said that when she was a child, she served with her mom at the old Kitchen in downtown Oceanside, and her current parish donates regularly to the Foundation.

WOMAN FINALLY LEAVES HOMELESSNESS BEHIND

With all the sadness and need we see in the world every day, it's heartening when a "happy-ending" story comes along. Such is the case of "Lois," who—after eight years of being homeless—has just moved into her own apartment. She had finally qualified for Section 8 Housing, and with a little boost from Brother Benno's, she was ready to move in.

Lois is able to get supplementary food at the Center, and the Brother Benno Thrift Shop is helping her with furniture and other household items. Because she has a physical disability and has been unable to work, SSI payments now make it possible for her to pay rent as well as buy food and other necessities.

"She just beams with joy every time I see her," said **Mary Holguin**, a volunteer who helps our Guests with housing and utility payments. "She's had no help from her family," Mary added, "because her daughter is struggling with alcoholism, which also means that her grandchildren are now living out-of-state with their father. She misses them terribly."

Actually, during her years of homelessness, Brother Benno's was Lois's home and family. She came for the meal and a shower every morning, and everyone seemed to know and care about her.

Lois, and many others like her, has a new outlook on life because someone was kind enough to donate money and/or saleable items to Brother Benno's, and Staff members were able to make good things happen.

FROM THE BOOK

For those of us who knew Harold and Kay Kutler well, hardly a day goes by that we don't reminisce about them. "What would Kay think about that?" "How would Harold handle this situation?" Kay died in 2012, Harold in 2018, but they continue to guide us as we try to carry out their life-giving ministry by loving and caring for those in need. The following excerpt from Harold's book is a whimsical look at how they met. (Chapter 4)

"Marriage and family seemed like a good alternative to my earlier plan of becoming a priest, so I joined the S.C.O.T. Club (Single Catholics Over Twenty-three). Ironically, I'd been at the first meeting of this club eight years earlier, along with 17 ladies. The odds were somewhat threatening. Besides, I was already thinking about the priesthood, so I didn't return. But now I was ready to begin socializing with men and women my age.

"I entered the hall shyly that first night, but the ladies were anything but shy. They were there to catch a husband, but I didn't know that then.

"After a few meetings, I carefully got my feet wet by dancing with different girls following the business part of the evening. The next step was going out with small groups for coffee afterward.

"Finally I made a phone call, and I had my first date in eight years—with a lovely blonde Swedish nurse. This relationship didn't go anywhere, but it brought me back into the boy-girl arena.

"The next young lady who attracted my attention was Kay, when she spoke up one night at the club's business meeting. There had been some sentiment for dropping the club's bowling team, but Kay had other ideas.

"Hey, you guys, it's great exercise, and we have a lot of fun doing it, and it attracts new members." After more lively discussion, we took a vote, with Kay's side winning. I said to myself: Now there's a spunky, enthusiastic gal who must be a pretty good athlete.

"The next bowling night, I was in the crowd to see if Kay was going to measure up to my expectations. She went over to the rack, picked up her ball, and rolled it down the left gutter. It must have slipped out of her hand, I thought. Her next ball rolled down the right gutter. Sorry to say, there was little improvement during the course of the evening.

"Why in the world was she so adamant about keeping the bowling team, when she's such a terrible bowler, I wondered.

"At the next meeting, I asked Kay to dance so I could find out.

"Hey, she said, in school they never let me be on any team, so just being on a team is a thrill for me." She gave me her impish grin. 'I'm never concerned about the score, because it really doesn't matter. I just like being on a team with people who like me regardless of what score I bowl. We have a lot of fun together.'

"This was a refreshing point of view toward sports, but it was absolutely opposite of mine. I enjoyed playing most sports, but winning was the main thing. Kay's athletic ability didn't impress me, but her infectious enthusiasm was tantalizing. "


