PROGRAM MEMBERS KEEP CENTER HUMMING

The men in Brother Benno's Recovery Program are "the backbone of our Center," according to one of the Servants of the Poor. To back up that statement, here's the schedule these men follow:

For the first three months of the Program, they work six days a week; the second three months it's five days a week. They get up at 4 a.m., arrive at the Center at 5, and work until 1 p.m., Monday through Friday. On Saturday, it's 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The men clean bathrooms, sweep and mop floors, man and maintain the shower hygiene station, wash trays and cookware, prep food, cook meals, pick up, load, and unload food and household donations, pick up and deliver furniture donations and sales, and wash vehicles. They also staff special projects like food drives, and they carry trays and food boxes for Guests who can't manage on their own. In the evenings, they attend twelve-step meetings.

At least once a year, the Brother Benno Foundation tries to give these men a day of rest and fun by taking them to an amusement park or other tourist attraction. In the past, Knotts Berry Farm was a favorite outing, but the cost has become prohibitive, so last year they spent the day at the USS Midway in San Diego and by all reports had a great time.

In addition to the admission price for the attraction, there's the cost of transportation and meals for the day. And this year, that money simply isn't available. We have 30 men currently in the Program, plus eight senior Program members,

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STUDENTS CREATE POEMS ON LUNCH BAGS

Ninth grade students in **Catherine Close**'s English class at La Costa Canyon High School in Carlsbad were given an assignment to write a short poem as part of a commemoration of the March on Washington in 1963, where **Martin Luther King, Jr.** gave his famous "I Have a Dream" speech.

"I had my students read two poems by Langston Hughes, including A Dream Deferred," she said. "We discussed the fact that Martin Luther King Jr.'s speech built on the dreams that others had before him. Then I talked about the importance of my students having dreams and that others in our community might have dreams that they are struggling to realize. I told them about Brother Benno's and suggested that they could write the final draft of their poems on lunch bags to inspire a homeless person to keep going. We all have dreams"

The students' poetry-on-lunch-bags are hanging on the wall in the Brother Benno dining room. When they are taken down, they will be filled with the typical nutritious lunch that is available to our Guests five days a week after the morning meal is served.

BROTHER BENNO'S HONORS 20-YEAR VOLUNTEER

The dining room at Brother Benno's over-flowed with well-wishers on September 30, as we gathered to honor 20-year volunteer **John Jarvie** on his 90th birthday. John, in his typically humble fashion, deflected the attention being paid to him by saluting all the Program Members—past and present—who he said were the real heroes at Brother Benno's.

"Every day is a birthday for them," he said, "a new beginning for the sober life they are trying to live." He pointed to a few of the men standing nearby, mentioning their names and how many years they've been sober.

John knows these men well, because they often help him with the many projects he oversees at the Center and the various Houses.* As Board member **John Blasier** pointed out, John Jarvie's

fingerprints are on every square inch of Brother Benno's facilities. Two former Program members also spoke about John's influence on them. One said

the beautiful tile floor in the dining room was just a rough cement surface when he arrived at Brother Benno's 20 years ago. Another said he owes his

skills in the construction business directly to John's tutoring. Getting back to the reason for the celebration, that of John's turning 90, he quipped: "I don't think about my age anymore; I stopped having

birthdays when I turned 60." He expanded on this idea of age not mattering when he said that having something valuable to do every day is what keeps

people going. And he ought to know: he shows up at the Center five days a week, quietly creating beauty and function in every corner of the building, and mentoring the younger guys in the process.

And what kind of birthday gift do you give to a man who has lived as long as John has, and who appears to have everything he needs? You give him a new hammer—an apt symbol for a man with his talents—and just as an added bonus, you add an inscription that reads: "To John Jarvie for 20 years of service."


