The insurance adjustor was very impressed by the effort to minimize the damage.

THIRTY-ONE YEARS ... AND COUNTING ...

Every October, we celebrate the beginning of the Brother Benno Foundation, which has been in existence for 31 years. Even though many of our readers know at least part of the story, we like to feature the highlights in October for anyone who happens to be new to our newsletter. And for readers who want the full story of the first 20 years, we offer Harold Kutler's book, *Soup Soap Hugs Hope, the Story of Brother Benno's Life-Changing Soup Kitchen*. (It's available for a donation in any amount. See page 4.)

Little did Harold and Kav Kutler know, when they served homemade soup and freshly baked bread to 18 homeless men on October 21, 1983, that they were starting what would become one of the most compassionate and well-known ministries in San Diego County. The soup and bread were made by Brother Benno Garrity, a Benedictine monk at what is now called the Prince of Peace Abbey in Oceanside. The meal was served in the back yard of an old two-bedroom house in downtown Oceanside. Eventually, groups from churches, service clubs, businesses, mobile home parks, and the military became regular monthly serving teams; and a few of those original teams (usually with new members) continue to serve today.

By 1991, it was obvious that the growing ministry needed more space, and the Foundation moved to a 12,000-square-foot warehouse in an industrial park, where it is still housed today. In addition to serving a hot meal six days a week, we provide used clothing, showers, haircuts, laundry facilities, bus passes, blankets, and supplementary

food packs—all free to the homeless and needy. Rent and prescription assistance are also available on a restricted basis as funds become available. While we started serving only the homeless, today the vast majority of our Guests are working poor families with children.

Most supporters of Brother Benno's are individuals, businesses, corporations, and churches. They donate money, food, and clothing, as well as household items and furniture which are given to the poor or sold in our Thrift Shop, where all profits are turned back into the Foundation.

Harold Kutler continues to be an active presence at Brother Benno's. His beloved wife Kay died on February 15, 2012, after a long illness; but her loving spirit is felt everywhere and is being carried on by many others. Kay had a contagious smile and a beautiful singing voice, but she was most known for the hugs she gave to every person who walked in the door. Even after she was confined to a wheelchair, she continued to reach up to everyone as they came near. And many of us believe that our angel Kay continues to watch over us from above


