PROGRAM GRADUATE PROVES IT'S NEVER TOO LATE TO CHANGE

"Rosemary" was in her mid-50's—older than most—when she came to Brother Benno's for help with her alcoholism. "I always thought I was managing my drinking just fine," she said. Through the years, she and her husband were social drinkers, and it wasn't affecting her ability to work. They had plenty of money and a lovely home, and they traveled extensively.

Then little by little, she began to sense that maybe things were getting out of hand. But it wasn't her fault, she said, it was her husband who was making life difficult; so after 21 years of marriage, she divorced him. They were living in another state at the time, and her siblings in California urged her to come home where she could benefit from their support.

"Alcoholism runs in my family," Rosemary said. Her mother and a sister had managed to get sober on their own, so she figured if she needed to, she could do the same. She moved in with one of her sisters and started attending AA meetings.

"But I continued to drink," she admitted. "Nothing in AA made sense to me."

Her health was suffering by this time. She wasn't eating properly; and after a particularly long drinking spree, she suffered a seizure. Finally frightened enough, she called a woman she'd met at AA who happened to be part of the Brother Benno Recovery Program staff. This was at the beginning of 2015, and she successfully completed the Program six months later.

She moved back in with her sister, and

two months later, she left home without telling anyone where she was going, checked herself into a hotel, and drank steadily for five days. "My family was devastated with worry," she said. "They contacted the police, checked hospitals. And when I finally came back, they were frustrated and angry with me. I felt so ashamed. I crawled into bed with my bottle and didn't eat for three days. I felt I had lost my will to live."

At that point, she said, one of her brothers came into the bedroom, knelt down next to the bed where he could look directly into her face, and said, "How can we help you?" Out of the fog she was in, Rosemary said, "Call Brother Benno's."

The Staff member told her brother that if they could keep her from drinking for three days (the detox period), they would take her back into the Program.

"Detox is awful," Rosemary said. She'd done it several times over the years, always on her own, rather than going into a facility. But with the vigilance of her sisters and brothers, she managed once again.

After graduating again from our six-month Program, Rosemary was invited to stay on for another six months and run our transitional House for women who have graduated from the Program but aren't quite ready to go out on their own. "I loved being there," she said. It gave her a chance to mentor other women, and she herself was able to stay in close touch with the Staff.

Above and Beyond. Sometimes it isn't enough to just give a Guest much needed socks and shoes. A man with Parkinson's needed both, but he wasn't able to maneuver himself into a position to put them on, so **Carol Muehe** sat on the floor and did it for him.

Some of our Guests have a hard time taking a

shower because of various conditions of infirmity, but there's always someone eager to help, whether it's a Staff member, volunteer, or another Guest. They simply go into the shower with them. I am in awe of people who are so self-giving. Reminds me of the Good Samaritan, who came across a stranger who'd been beaten and robbed, lying on the side of the road. He bound up his wounds, took him to an inn to recuperate, and paid the inn-keeper for everything.

Another amazing thing about some of our Staff and volunteers is their patience. A Guest with obvious mental issues might tell the same sad story day after day, and I see the same look of interest and concern on the face of the listener as if he or she is hearing it for the first time. That's what makes Brother Benno's so special.

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Rosemary has been sober now for two years, and she celebrates the anniversary of her sobriety with more enthusiasm than her birthday. "I see again," she said. "I was in complete darkness, and now I am in the light. Sobriety creates balance, stability, trust in God again." She now has a community of like-minded people at Brother Benno's and AA who give her support and encouragement.

She also had to heal relationships with her family. "We talk about it now," she said. "Before, we tried to keep it (her alcoholism) hidden." And she doesn't feel shame anymore. "That's in the past. I live in the present. You get everything back with sobriety," she said. And that's what she tells others who are in the process of changing their lives.

Rosemary has a job she loves, a family who cares about her, and in some sense another "family" at AA and Brother Benno's. She often comes to the Center so she can catch up with everyone who was—and still is—part of her recovery journey.

AN UPDATE ON HAROLD

Our beloved Founder, **Harold Kutler**, will be celebrating his 91st birthday on September 22. His son **Jim**, who lives with him, told us that his dad is "doing well and taking it day by day."

Harold pops in at the Center once or twice a week, said volunteer **Frank Doherty**, "for just a short while, long enough to give out hugs to the Staff and the homeless whom he loves."


