AN INTERCONNECTED COMMUNITY HELPS EACH OTHER THRIVE

Community support provides the very backbone for all that Brother Benno's is able to accomplish. This assistance comes in a variety of forms. Here are just a few examples: volunteers who offer time and effort; benefactors who contribute financial support; businesses that donate food or other resources; and members of the community who give used clothing to be sold at the Thrift Store.

Another excellent example of this community spirit is the installation of solar panels at Brother Benno's. Without community activists, this project never would have been possible. And, in turn, this project itself will benefit not only Brother Benno's, but also the community at large.

Early last spring, **Diane Nygaard** approached Brother Benno's with the idea of installing rooftop solar in order to cut its electrical bill and reduce its carbon footprint. The idea was attractive, but as is often the case, the question came down to obtaining the money

necessary to finance such an ambitious project.

And this is where the interconnectedness of the community comes into play. In addition to being a long-time friend of Brother Benno's, who has spoken eloquently on its behalf before various planning commission meetings, Diane is also a founding member of Preserve Calavera. An organization originally founded in 2000, Preserve Calavera's focus started with the goal to preserve open space and the water shed around Lake Calavera. Preserve Calavera has taken on many projects, such as wetlands expansion and tree plantings. However, as Diane explains, it soon became clear that her organization's efforts at conservation "would be meaningless" if they did not address the root causes of climate change as a whole.

As part of a settlement involving a development project in Oceanside, Preserve Calavera fought to ensure that mitigation measures used to offset

BROTHER BENNO FOUNDATION CHANGES

There are some changes going on at Brother Benno's, and so as your Executive Director, I wanted to share a little bit about what is changing. As many of you know, we have four major services that we provide - Clothing, Food, Recovery, and Working Poor preventative services. There are of course sub categories to each one of those that we engage in, but the important point is there are organizations that only deal with one of them. The fact that we provide four services is a credit to the support this organization has had from all of you over these past 40 years.

So as a quick summary of our changes we are refining two of those areas – Clothing and Food.

In the Clothing Service category, we have consolidated all of those

efforts at the Thrift store but built a clothing "boutique" for our guests at the Center and expanded the hours to now include Saturday. Under Food Service, we are in the process of building an indoor 'supermarket for our guests and working poor families. And we are initiating an improved Food Distribution system. Additionally, we are improving the distribution layout for our Essential Services.

The thought behind these changes was not just being more efficient so we could provide more with less, but also uplifting the dignity of our guests.

Finally, we are moving a few of the staff around to take on greater responsibility. When all is done, we are considering an open house event. If that comes to fruition, we will keep you posted. Thank you for your continued support.

environmental impacts of the project were reinvested in the local community rather than applied out of state. The proceeds from this settlement were placed in the Oceanside **Greenhouse Gas Emission Reduction** Fund, which is administered by the San Diego Foundation on behalf of Preserve Calavera. Through a grant provided by the Preserve Calavera, Brother Benno's was able to obtain roughly 70 percent of the necessary costs for the solar project. BQuest Foundation provided up-front costs for much of the remaining amounts, which will later be reimbursed by the government.

Brother Benno's incurred some costs, such as those necessary to repair its roof in order to install the solar panels. However, much of these repairs would have been necessary

at some point anyway, and other costs will be covered by future savings. By completing the project, The Brother Benno Foundation expects to reduce its electrical bill by over one million dollars over a 25-year period. The cost savings from this project will further fund needed assistance to aid and uplift the lives of our guests. The project will also substantially lessen the fossil fuels necessary to generate the 23,000 kWh of electricity that Brother Benno's consumes every year.

Thus, the community's efforts to come together to assist Brother Benno's and its guests have, in turn, allowed Brother Benno's to better the community by reducing its carbon pollution—a win-win for everybody!



On January 1, 2024, long-time volunteer and donor **Rich Miro** passed away. Rich was a veteran of the Marine Corps and also employed as a financial analyst by the City of San Diego.

He came to help out at Brother Benno's after his retirement in 2004. Rich volunteered in a variety of areas at the Brother Benno Foundation including driving trucks and helping with community outreach. However, it was in his final volunteer role where he literally kept the lights on.

During the pandemic, Rich would be the only person to come into volunteer in our accounting office. All other volunteers were in the age range, or for other reasons, at higher risk of becoming very ill, hosptalized, or dying from Covid. The truth is, Rich was also one of those folks. But he would come in with his mask on and volunteer almost every day.

He picked up mail, processed bills (including the utility bills), wrote checks and kept the Foundation's business afloat during a very difficult time.

We wrote a <u>spotlight</u> about Rich back in September 2020.

We were all grateful when he received his vaccination at the Center in April 2021.

Rich continued to volunteer in the accounting department up until November 2023. His smarts, spark, and smile made an impact on all who knew him. He will be sorely missed.


