REMEMBERING BARBARA: A VOLUNTEER WHO LEFT A LEGACY

On January 22nd, the Brother Benno Foundation lost one of its longest serving, selfless and loving volunteers,

Barbara and her husband **Bob Ladwig** were volunteers at Brother Benno's from the beginning in 1983. The Ladwigs served food at the original Brother Benno's Kitchen, a small house in downtown Oceanside. This location is still owned by the Foundation and is being used as a sober living house today.

Barbara became the editor of the Brother Benno's newsletter for most of its existence. She collected stories, talked to the staff, edited, and wrote most of the newsletter, including a monthly column "Experiencing the Brother Benno Scene" where she would use her keen observational skills to share stories about the happenings at Brother Benno's.

In addition, Barbara played a major role

in the creation of Harold Kutler's "Soup Soap Hugs Hope" book. On the cover, there is an acknowledgment of Barbara's Barbara Ladwig. For those of you who work and inside there is a photograph of Barbara and a discussion of how the book is part of her legacy. Harold always wanted to call her the co-author, but she quite certain she was.) In addition,

Barbara worked closely with Harold on written materials

he developed, and prepared thank you letters for donors to Brother Benno's on a monthly basis.

Barbara had tremendous empathy for the poor and such a kind heart. I enjoyed getting to know her and working with her during my time on the Board of Directors at

the Brother Benno Foundation. She also graciously mentored me without me even knowing I was being mentored.

When Barbara decided it was time to step down from the newsletter, we thought we had found her replacement in a lovely volunteer. That volunteer stepped down due to family commitments a month later. But the truth is, nobody could have filled Barbara Ladwig's shoes.

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SECURITY, SAFETY AND COMPASSION

Issac Rutherford and Habib Waheed balance safety and compassion daily at Brother Benno's. Hired as security guards, both men are establishing a stable presence at the Brother Benno's Center.

Sometimes that means telling jokes to guests. Laughter works too. The goal is to provide a safe place for everyone – guests, volunteers, recovery program members, staff, outside organizations, and the community as a whole.

Inspired by his military background, Issac works to build bridges with our guests. He uses community-oriented policing methodologies to do this. "You get to know people, they get to know you," Issac shared when explaining how community-oriented policing works in practice.

"You create alliances. Build rapport. In the military we call it 'winning hearts and minds.' I know through my rapport building and friendships, I am going to get compliance to policies and rules followed."

Habib is an immigrant from Afghanistan. He has been in the U.S. since 2018 and is a graduate of Hoover High School and currently attends

college part time at San Diego City College.

"I like to help homeless people, to protect and take care of them, and to protect them from each other," said Habib about his role as a security officer at Brother Benno's. He appreciates it when our guests treat him with respect, listen to him, and follow the rules. Safety is important to him.

It is Habib's first time working security. He's doing a fantastic job, reports Issac, who is currently mentoring Habib. "He soaks up every bit of teaching I give him like a sponge with water."

Issac is inspired by the mission of the Brother Benno Foundation. He speaks about the Brother Benno heart and being a part of the Brother Benno family. "We are a faithbased organization," Issac says. "My personal faith is Christianity, so I see a lot of the heart of Christ here. A lot of people talk about loving people the way Jesus would love them, but there really is no action there. We are people of action. We put our faith to work."

According to Habib, "It doesn't matter if you are Muslim, Christian or other religions as long as you are helping people....We are all humans."



FAMILY SEPARATION IN RECOVERY

Living through addiction treatment while being away from family presents numerous challenges. While programs like the Men's Twelve Step Recovery Program at the Brother Benno Foundation offer invaluable support and structure, the absence of family members can intensify the emotional strain of the journey to sobriety.

One of the primary difficulties is the absence of familial support. Family members often serve as a source of motivation, encouragement, and accountability during addiction recovery. Being separated from them can lead to feelings of isolation and loneliness, which may exacerbate the temptation to relapse. However, with the support of programs like Brother Benno's and the determination to overcome obstacles, individuals can navigate this challenging path towards a healthier, sober life.

Moreover, being away from family means missing out on important events and milestones. Birthdays, holidays, and family gatherings can evoke a sense of nostalgia and longing, making it harder to stay focused

on recovery goals. Without the presence of loved ones, individuals may struggle to find meaning and purpose in their journey towards sobriety.

Furthermore, communication barriers can hinder the ability to maintain strong connections with family members and children. Limited access to phone calls or internet communication can make it difficult to stay in touch regularly, leading to feelings of estrangement and disconnection. However, that's not always the case.

Jonathan A. says "I thought the separation from my kids would make things worse. But since my enrollment here to the six-month program, our conversations have been more meaningful. They are talking to their real father, not the father they saw as ill."

The journey of addiction recovery is undoubtedly arduous, and being away from family only adds to the complexity of the process. The ethos of service embraced by participants fosters a sense of belonging and purpose, helping to alleviate some of the loneliness experienced in the absence of family.

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SERVING TEAMS NEEDED

Do you belong to a group that wants to help serve? The Brother Benno's Center has three openings for its breakfast serving line.

The openings are on the 3rd Tuesday and 4th Monday of every month. In addition, we have an opening for a 5th Thursday shift which happens whenever there is a 5th Thursday in the month, about 3-4 times a year. We ask that a group of serving team volunteers arrive at the Brother Benno's Center by

6:15 a.m. and serve breakfast until around 8 a.m. The ideal group size is between 4-8 people.

We also have some spots available in 2024 for our 2nd Saturday of the month. If your group wants to try out the serving experience before committing to a regular spot on our schedule, this might be a great way to experience what it's like to serve a meal at Brother Benno's. 

I would like to recount for you all a story of a good Samaritan that I found especially edifying. During the Christmas season, Brother Benno's puts on the annual Christmas party at the thrift store. Hundreds of children show up to have their faces painted, receive toys and gift cards, and to talk to Santa Claus. One familv. however, was unable to come as the father had unexpectedly and rather tragically passed away during the year, and the mother of the family, "Holly", was unfortunately hospitalized right before Christmas and well into January.

Here enters our good Samaritan. "Margie" had been lifelong friends with Holly, and when she had heard about the situation with Holly, she felt she had to help. Holly has three children, the youngest of which is 3 years old. Margie wanted to do something for Christmas for her family and for Holly's kids, but she had no financial ability to cater to them. let alone her own children. She had no idea what she was going to do, as Holly's children were without their parents for their first major holiday and had nobody else to turn to.

Margie came to the Brother Benno

Center for Christmas day dinner and got a food box to help feed the additional mouths. A little after Christmas she asked if there was anything we could do for her. Thanks be to God; we had some left-over gift cards and toys from the Christmas party, so she was able to provide a belated Christmas celebration. Some time passed, and January arrived. I was able to meet Holly as she had come with her friend Margie to thank us for the help and to get another food box.

I asked Margie how she was able to muster up the courage to take the responsibility and care of someone else's kids when she could barely take care of her own. She replied "I was just walking by faith. All you have to do is to be willing to help others out in their time of need. and God will take care of the rest." Reflecting on her quote, the following passages from scripture come to mind; Matthew 6:31-32: "Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear? For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all."
