LENDING A HELPING HAND SOUTH OF THE BORDER

Partnering with St. Elizabth Seton Church, representatives of Brother Benno's delivered and provided food to the Nazareth Orphanage in Tecate, Mexico.

On March 23rd, Elias Velazquez (Brother Benno's new Volunteer Coordinator) and his girlfriend Melisa Martinez (a grant writer for Brother Benno's) loaded up a pickup truck and a Jeep and together with Dennis Ofcacek, (St. Elizabeth Seton), delivered nonperishable food items such as rice, peanut butter, and canned vegetables, to the orphanage.

Nazareth Orphanage shelters 50 to 60 boys and girls of all ages. While many of the children have lost both parents, others have been placed at the orphanage by their families who were unable to care for them. The experience was particularly impactful to Elias, whose mother grew up in a similar facility in Mexico.

Father Brian Kelly, a retired Naval chaplain, began this remarkable labor of love in 1994. Young Marines from Camp Pendleton helped him with these efforts at the start. Eventually, this

assistance became part of the St. Elizabeth Seton ministry.

After unloading the food, the Brother Benno's crew was able to assist with volunteer work, such as repairing broken bicycles. The children then treated them to a traditional dance performance.

Because Elias and Melisa speak Spanish, they were able to connect with the children in a personal way. Elias notes how impressed he was with their high spirits despite their dire conditions. There is no financial support of the orphanage by the Catholic Church, the Mexican government, or by any other means than through donations, like this. Elias was encouraged in our ability to "help each other out while running on faith."

Details for future trips are in the works, and Brother Benno's is already collectingdonations of clothes, toys, and school supplies. "It is a tremendous blessing that Brother Benno's is able to supply food and clothing, down there," Dennis Ofcacek shared.


John Blasier became involved with the Brother Benno Foundation in the late 1980s through his friendship with long-time Brother Benno Foundation Board Member, Nick Sauer. John was the president and CEO of Monitor Products, an Oceanside business in the same business park the Brother Benno Center is now located in.

Nick asked John what he thought

"John was a hands-on executive," said his friend and fellow board member Richard Shlemmer.

"Even though he had a demanding full-time manufacturing business in the neighborhood, he would spend countless hours at Brother Benno's eating breakfast and lunch with guests and staff, getting to know everyone from the bottom up."

John was gruff but loving and he was a good listener. He took a particular interest in the recovery program and the individuals working on their sobriety.

"Well Nick," John told him, "They've got to go someplace, and I can't think of a better organization" to be a part of the business park. This led to John being asked to join the Board of Directors for the Brother Benno Foundation. He served as the President of the Board of Directors from 1993 to 2002.

A passionate alumnus of the University of Southern California, Richard recalls Brother Benno Foundation board meetings that would be interrupted by the USC fight song. He also had a pilot's license and flew from Oceanside in his Beech Baron. He spent his downtime in San Antonio del Mar in Baja as well as vacationing in Hawaii.

John passed away on April 5, 2024 (Good Friday) and will be missed by all who knew and loved him.

OPINION: ON THE CAUSE OF HOMELESS-NESS

Recently, I was asked what I thought the root cause of homelessness was and if it could be solved. Many Individuals suffer from a wide variety of challenges, the complexity of which I will not bore you with now; ultimately, the common denominator is chronic helplessness. Some individuals are unable to deal with the problems they currently have, and any attempt to remedy them is met with overwhelming hurdles that they can't conquer alone. In the haughtiness of human ambition, many set out to "cure" or to "solve" the problem of homelessness. However, our Lord says in Matthew 26:11 "For you will always have the poor with you...". It seems therefore that we can't "cure" homelessness. So, what can be done, and who do we look to for the answers?

Historically, a lot of the help came from the family. Working as a case worker here at Brother Bennos, I have come to find that a majority of the people who are chronically helpless come from fractured or hurting families. This could be caused by the political divide, high divorce rate, or the pervading culture which has resulted in the weakening of the family. This is not always the case, however. In some instances, a family must tie their hands to prevent enabling destructive behaviors. How then, can society address the com-

plexity of the situation, and help the people in need?

I believe it's up to each member of society to be loving and charitable to those less fortunate. It doesn't take a special skillset or personality to help; we all have something to contribute! The first step is getting involved in your community. This could mean donating, helping someone you see on the street, or volunteering at a place like Brother Bennos. Here at Brother Bennos, we care for all the needs of the homeless; from the basics such as showers, food, and connections to shelter, to helping individuals with finding detox centers, setting up appointments for mental health treatment, writing resumes, finding jobs, etc. I implore you, our readers! If you've ever felt the desire to help those less fortunate, or want to make a difference, then look no further than volunteering here at Brother Bennos!

Along with the basic needs, transportation to and from support meetings is covered through donations to the foundation.

of their community. Engaging in various service activities, from serving meals to the homeless to organizing donations and distributing food to those in need, participants discover a sense of purpose and fulfillment that transcends their personal struggles.

Through service, these men forge meaningful connections with their fellow peers and the broader community. Bonds formed through shared experiences of giving back foster a sense of belonging and acceptance, counteracting the isolation often experienced in the throes of addiction.

INDOOR MARKET BECOMES A REALITY

Families, people with disabilities and seniors on limited incomes face difficult choices when trying to make their dollars stretch to cover ever-increasing expenses. And, if an emergency, accident, job loss, or a serious health condition or disability arises, life becomes even more challenging. It is out of a desire to better address this need that the idea for Brother Benno's Indoor Market emerged. An indoor market would also elevate our existing food distribution process for our guests, thus fulfilling our motto of uplifting the dignity of those we serve.

The indoor market will provide our guests with a variety of food options; and we could increase refrigeration capacity to keep food fresher for longer as well. Plans also include switching from food box distribution to reusable bags to make it easier for guests to carry items home. To "shop" the market, guests must be registered with Brother Benno's. (Registration can be completed in one visit during our regular hours of operation.)

Feeding San Diego has already committed to a grant that is funding 75% of the funds needed for Brother Benno's Indoor Market. In-kind donations such as food from local grocery stores, additional grant funding, and generous donations from supporters like you will cover the costs and materials not covered by the grant. Coming to the Center? We'd love you to see Brother Benno's Indoor Market. A temporary market is set up inside the warehouse and our guests appreciate the improved experience.


