# THANK YOU, PELON

Craig "Pelon" Mercer rises before the sun and drives in the dark to the Brother Benno's Center where he prepares breakfast for hundreds of hungry people each morning.

You might have seen him recently with a cane and a limp but also with the same fierce determination and dedication that has guided him as the chef of The

Brother Benno's kitchen since 2008. Pelon will be hanging up his apron and retiring at the end of July after 20 years with The Brother Benno Foundation.

Jan Roberts sums up what many of those at Brother Benno's feel about Pelon. "He is a

miracle, coming from where he comes from and blessing us with his service to the kitchen and his dedication to all who come across his path. It has been my honor to have worked with him for so many years."

Pelon's legacy includes cooking thousands of nourishing, warm meals for the unsheltered and working poor in North San Diego County. "If you want the help, it's freely given here," Pelon explained

in a 2010 video. "There is nothing like Brother Benno's around here."

In addition to cooking meals, Pelon has mentored numerous men and women who participated in the Brother Benno Foundation's drug and alcohol recovery program.

"Pelon is a guy who gains the respect of people and makes them feel comfort-

able," said his friend

Ben Meyer. "He has a
special way of encouraging people to realize
their full potential.

When Pelon believes
in you (and he has
seen and mentored so
many people), it's a
special feeling - it's the
real deal. He's seen a

lot, he knows a lot, and he'll encourage you to grow."

Pelon himself is in recovery and he is grateful for all it did for him personally. "What the recovery program has done for me is help me clean my life up, regain my self-respect and esteem. It brought my faith in God back in my life," Pelon shared.

# **BROTHERHOOD IN RECOVERY: Supporting Each Other Through the Journey**

At the heart of the Brother Benno's Foundation recovery program lies a powerful force for change: the bonds formed between men as they navigate the challenging path to sobriety together, creating a brother-hood that becomes instrumental in their collective healing and growth.

From the moment a new member enters the program, they are welcomed into a community of men who understand the struggles of addiction firsthand.

As members progress through Phase 1, they develop a routine of shared experiences. Daily volunteer work at the Brother Benno's Foundation center provides opportunities for teamwork and mutual encouragement. Men work side by side, sharing stories, offering advice, and sometimes just lending a listening ear. These shared tasks foster a sense of purpose and camaraderie among the program members.

While each man works individually with his sponsor, the group dynamic plays a crucial role in this process. Members often gather informally to discuss their progress, challenges, and insights gained from working the 12 steps of AA. These conversations create an atmosphere of openness and vulnerability, allowing men to break down the walls of isolation that addiction often builds.

One of the most powerful aspects of peer support comes during moments of crisis. When a program member struggles with cravings or faces personal setbacks, his brothers in recovery rally around him. They offer words of encouragement,

share their own experiences of overcoming similar challenges, and sometimes simply provide a steadying presence. This support becomes a crucial lifeline, often making the difference between relapse and continued sobriety.

As members transition into Phase 2, the nature of their support evolves. Those who have been in the program longer become mentors to newer members. This act of giving back not only helps newcomers but also reinforces the mentors' own commitment to recovery. Increased independence in Phase 2 also allows for deeper friendships to form, as men have more opportunities to connect outside of structured program activities.

Progress to Graduate Housing and Transitional Living, the bonds formed earlier continue to play a vital role. Graduates often return to share their successes and challenges, offering hope and inspiration to those still in the earlier phases. Lifelong friendships that extend far beyond their time in the program, create a support network that endures through the ups and downs of life in recovery.


By supporting each other through every stage of recovery, these men increase their chances of long-term sobriety and rediscover the joys of genuine human connection. This brotherhood becomes a foundation upon which they can rebuild their lives, one day at a time, surrounded by others who truly understand the journey.


